THE reorganization of the fire
company is a matter of great im-

vices in an active way, the open-
ing for the business men is in a

must be given, and harmony must
prevail. It is also the intention
of the fire company to ask the
aid of the ladies of the town to
give what assistance is within
their power to help raise funds.
There are suits, more apparatus,
fire house, and other things that
could be used to an advantage by
the firemen, and it is hoped that
all will give their aid and
encouragement.
