Mr. Joseph Hultzer fought
Mr. Bryan for twelve years.
That is, Mr. Pulitzer's papers,
the New York World and St.
Louis Post Dispatch fought him.
The following Pulitzer editorial
is interesting:

"Mr. Bryan's letter to the
president was the logical and
legitimate return to the trust
Mr. Roosevelt made at the Demo-
cratic ticket in his address to the
public in behalf of Mr. Bryan on
the subject of the Hearst charges.
Mr. Bryan asks the president
to supply proof of the truth
of the charge against the editor
Haskell, which the president
repeats and adopts as his own.
When Mr. Roosevelt stands down
from the presidency to get into
the muck of a campaign contro-
versy he must expect to be called
to account. When he places him-
self in the position of a partisan
politician, vehemently attacking
the party opposing his candidate
and slandering his own candidate
with fulsome eloquence, he must
expect to be treated as a parti-
san politician. It is difficult to
see how he can avoid meeting
Mr. Bryan's dignified, but point-
ed, demand or, answering Mr.
Mack's request for a retraction
of the charge that he had re-
ceived \$30,000 from the former

Democratic national committee.
Mr. Roosevelt is giving the coun-
try an extraordinary spectacle of
partisan political activity on the
part of a president. Acting as
a national boss, he forged the
nomination of Mr. Taft and is
now practically managing his
campaign. He has assumed
leadership in the fight and is the
chief advocate and defender of
the party candidate and his
cause. As a partisan campaign
leader Mr. Roosevelt will prob-
ably sacrifice much of his in-
fluence as president, and as for
Mr. Taft, the poor man is in dan-
ger of depending upon the pos-
sibility of proxy to that of puppet."
