Cost of Levee.

Bryan, Texas, Oct. 16. Chief Engineer T. L. Smith of Eagle Lake has completed the permanent survey of the Brazos river levee on the Burleson county side. Mr. Smith is now at the Agricultural and Mechanical College, and with Prof. Nagle is making the calculations from the data of the survey of the estimated cost of building the levee. After the estimate is made it will be presented to the commissioners court of Burleson county and if it is within the limit prescribed by law a special election will be ordered in the levee district to determine whether or not bonds shall be issued to the amount of 25 per cent of the value of the land in the district, and this was the object of this survey to make the survey in order to determine whether or not the levee will cost more than the legal amount.
