The open season for shooting
quail, and also doves, opens to-
morrow, November 1st. The
law says that no hunter shall
kill more than twenty-five of the
birds in one day, and that trap-
ping them in any manner is pro-
hibited. Some of the local hunt-
ers have asked the HEADLIGHT to
request that every hunter in this
vicinity destroy every trap that
he may come across, and if he
can find out by whom the trap
was put out, "turn him in" to
the game warden. As the first
of November comes on Sunday
it is likely that a great many
hunters from this place will be
out after the birds on the open-
ing day of the lawful season.

Creditors Meet in Houston.

A meeting of the creditors of
Vineyard, Walker & Co. was
held in Houston Monday before
referee in Bankruptcy H. L.
Borden and the proposition of
the trustees to compromise the
claims of M. D. Flowers and the
First National Bank of Eagle
Lake against the bankrupt estate
by permitting them to hold the
collaterals they have in full set-
tlement of their indebtedness
was ratified. Judge Borden later
confirmed the ratification of
the creditors.

Something in the neighbor-
hood of \$40,000 was due the two
creditors by the bankrupt es-
tate and they were holding as col-
lateral stocks of the First Na-
tional Bank of Eagle Lake, Dea-
ton, Grocery company and the
rice mills of Eagle Lake. It was
considered that the trustees
made a very advantageous settle-
ment and for that reason Judge
Borden approved the compro-
mise.
