Cause of Mr. Shugart's Death.

SOUR LAKE, Nov. 6.—Mr. T. W. Shugart, aged 28, died here this morning at 4 o'clock. Deceased came to Sour Lake last February from Eagle Lake to accept a position as cashier of the banking firm of R. S. Sterling & Co., which he held up to ten days ago, when he was stricken with toothache. The tooth was extracted and blood poison set in. He grew weaker day by day until the end came this morning. He remained conscious up to within an hour of the time when death claimed him. His wife, who is a teacher in the public schools, and his father and mother, Rev. and Mrs. W. O. Shugart of San Marcos, were with him. The schools dismissed today and all business houses closed while services were being conducted at the Methodist church by Rev. George Phair, under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias lodge. The remains were shipped to San Marcos over the Frisco this afternoon where interment will take place tomorrow. T. W. Shugart was universally liked.
