Manager of Texas Coast Land Co. is Here.

Mr. D. W. McCanna of Minneapolis, Minn., vice president and Texas manager of the Texas Coast Land Co. came in last Saturday to remain in Eagle Lake for three months. Mr. McCanna has headquarters at the Drummers' Home and his wife and daughter who will also spend the winter here are expected on the 19th. Mr. McCanna is here for the purpose of looking after the interests of the Texas Coast Land Co. and also the interests of the new settlers that have already bought and may buy tracts of land from the company during the winter. He reports that he has started three plows, well digging, building and fencing, and that during next month there will be fifteen houses on the company's land under construction. Mr. McCanna says all the parties who have purchased lands from the company expect to put in crops this spring. He has some individual land in this tract and it is his intention to put in a crop this spring on his own land. He says the farmers who are buying this land will make a specialty of potatoes, all kind of vegetables, with oranges and figs as soon as the land is sufficiently subdued to fit the same. There were originally 3300 acres in the Texas Coast Land Company's tract, lying between Eagle Lake and Ramsey's Point, but the company has already sold 1300 acres, no individual purchaser buying more than 20 acres. Nearly all who have bought land will move here from the North between now and spring and will build on their land and make their homes here. The Texas Coast Land Company will be the means of bringing many new settlers to the Eagle Lake country. Mr. McCanna expressed himself well pleased with this section of the country and says the prospects for his company are very bright indeed.

Buy National Bank Stock.

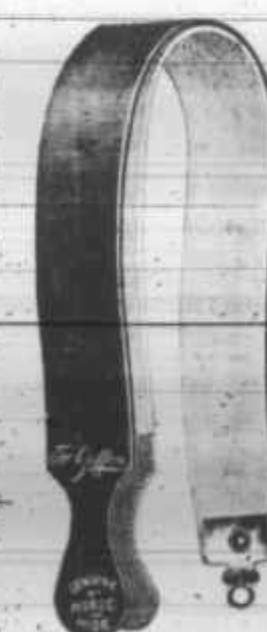
