THE STATE OF TEXAS.

To the Sheriff of any County of Colorado—Greeting: YOU ARE HEREBY COMMANDED to summon Wm. Lange by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the Twenty-fifth (25) Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 25th Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the district court of Colorado county, to be holden at the court house thereof, in Columbus, on the 2nd Monday in February A. D. 1909, the same being the eighth (8) day of February A. D. 1909, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 26th day of December A. D. 1908 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said court No. 7470, wherein T. J. Vick is plaintiff, and Wm. Lange is defendant, and said petition alleging: That he is lawfully seized and possessed of the following described land and premises in the town of Eagle Lake, Colorado county, Texas, to wit: A part of the P. Reels survey on the north side of and fronting on the G. H. & S. A. R. R. right-of-way: Beginning on the S. E. corner of Lake Ave. Thence S. E. along the north side of said right-of-way, 210 feet and corner; thence N. E. 210 feet to Church street, thence N. W. 210 feet to Lake Ave., thence S. W. along the east side of Lake Ave 210 feet to the place of beginning containing one acre of land. 2nd tract joins above tract on the east, beginning at the S. E. corner of said tract, on the said right-of-way; thence S. E. along said right-of-way 297 feet and corner on the B. & C. Jones estate land, then the property of Mrs. Alice Jones Franz. Thence N. E. along her west line 210 feet to Church street; thence N. W. along the south side of Church street 297 feet to the N. E. corner of the first mentioned tract; thence S. W. along the east line of said tract 210 feet to the place of beginning, containing about 2 1/2 acres of land.

Plaintiff alleges that defendant is setting up some kind of claim to said premises which cast a cloud upon plaintiff's title to said tracts of land, which plaintiff alleges that he purchased said tracts of land from the defendant on the 9th day of March, 1895, for value in good faith, and obtained a general warranty deed from this defendant, conveying said premises to this plaintiff. That he immediately entered in and upon said premises and took possession thereof and made valuable improvements thereon, which possession has been continuous from said date to the present time. That he has been in peaceable possession of said premises and has cultivated, used and enjoyed the said premises as a homestead under title and color of title for more than five years and has consecutively and continuously paid the taxes thereon for more than

five years, and claim the same adversely to every one since the date above mentioned to the present time. Plaintiff specially pleads the statutes of five and ten years limitation. Plaintiff avers that the deed above mentioned was by him filed with the county clerk of Colorado county, Texas, for record on the 9th day of March 1895, and was by said clerk duly recorded in Colorado County Deed Records in Vol. 19 Deed Records pages 208-9 and in said deed a vendor lien was retained by defendant to secure the payment of two notes, one for Two Hundred Dollars and one for Three Hundred Dollars, said notes were due and payable to the order of said defendant on the first day of July 1895, and on first day of January 1896 respectively.

Plaintiff further avers that each of said notes were by this plaintiff paid to said defendant, both principal and interest, and this defendant executed an instrument in writing, acknowledgment of the receipt of the money for said notes, and releasing the said tracts of land for said vendors lien. This instrument was and is dated March 18th 1896, and delivered the same to this plaintiff, but the defendant failed to acknowledge the execution of the said instrument in the manner required by law, which casts a cloud on plaintiff's title to the said tracts of land.

Wherefore the premises considered plaintiff prays that defendant be cited publication in the manner required by law, to answer plaintiff's petition at the next term of your Honorable court, and on a hearing that plaintiff have judgment, cancelling above mentioned lien and removing the cloud upon the title to the above mentioned tracts of land, and for such other and further orders and decrees both general and special as plaintiff may be entitled.
