Creditors of Vineyard, Walker & Co. Consider Land Sales.

A creditors' meeting was held in this city at the bank building on Monday afternoon of last week in the case of Vineyard, Walker & Co. to consider the sale of 3500 acres of land in Colorado and Wharton counties held under a lien by Vineyard, Walker & Co. to secure bonds of the Eagle Lake Irrigation Company.

Judge H. L. Borden, referee in bankruptcy, Attorneys T. M. Kernerly and R. G. Maury, representing the trustees, and Hon. Jake Walters, attorney for the bankrupt, were here from Houston to attend the meeting.

Notice was given to all creditors that the Eagle Lake Irrigation Company has contracted to sell to various persons approximately 3500 acres of land out of its holdings in Colorado and Wharton counties, and upon which the estate of Vineyard, Walker & Co. has a lien to secure bonds of said irrigation company amounting to \$100,000. The irrigation company has agreed to pay on said bonds to the trustees of Vineyard, Walker & Co. not less than \$25,000 in cash, and in addition thereto pay the interest on said bonds, and also to turn over to said trustees cash and vendor's lien notes aggregating not less than \$40,000, which notes are to be secured by vendor's liens on portions of land so sold and to be guaranteed by said irrigation company. In consideration of this the trustees of Vineyard, Walker & Co. are asked by the irrigation company to release from the lien securing said bonds the 3500 acres of land so sold, but the lien on the other and remaining 2300 acres to remain in full force.

The trustees have recommended the transaction and have applied to the court for authority to carry it out, and also for authority without further notice with the approval of and under the direction of the court, to release from time to time such other portions of said holdings of said irrigation company as it may sell upon such terms and conditions as the court may prescribe in each case.

He says when he gets in his new machinery, the light patrons of Eagle Lake will be furnished with better and brighter lights. The new management will continue to operate the waterworks and also the gin business. Another well will be put down at the ice plant and the old electric light plant will be retained for cases of emergency.
