COLUMBUS CENTENARIAN CELEBRATED BIRTHDAY.

"Uncle Stephen" Harbert of Columbus Was Born 100 Years Ago.

On January 15th., Mr. Stephen Harbert celebrated the one hundredth anniversary of his birth at a dinner given in Columbus by his daughter, Mrs. French Simpson. Mr. Harbert was born in Wythe county, Virginia, on January 15th, 1809. In 1815 he moved, with his family to Sparta, Tennessee, and while living in that state he met and formed the acquaintance of Sam Houston and David Crockett. His first vote was cast for Andrew Jackson in 1822, and he has lived during the life-time of all the presidents of the United States except that of George Washington. Mr. Harbert moved in 1843 from Tennessee to Mississippi, from which state he came Texas in an ox wagon and settled in Colorado county in the year 1852. He, same year that the late Senator Quay of Pennsylvania settled and taught school in this county. Mr. Harbert has for many years been a man of considerable means, and until recently has taken active part in political and public affairs. He was a man of great physical strength and endurance until about twelve years ago, when in an accident caused by a

runaway team, one of his legs was broken and other serious injuries were received. Since that time he has not been able to walk much, but before moving to Columbus last year he would occasionally come to town in his buggy from his plantation at Borden, ten miles away. He has always lived a strictly temperate life and of regular habits, with his physical constitution, account for his longevity. Mr. Harbert has been married twice; the first time in 1840 to Miss Nancy Vinson, who died in 1871, and the last time in 1875 to Mrs. Mollie Arrington, who is yet living. He is a consistent member of the Christian church.

The groom is a native of Assumption Parish, Louisiana, and at present is time-keeper and paymaster for the Lakeside Sugar Refining Co., at the Bonus plantation, and is popular with all who know him.
