Austin, Texas, Jan. 10.—The

Attorney General, Assistant

Lightfoot and Assistant Counsel

Brady have been deluged with

reference to the State's triumph

in the Water-Pierce master and

penalty and reformation cases.

The gist of them all was an ex-

pression of satisfaction that

"right had triumphed over

might."

Several recited a belief that the

decree of the court had estab-

lished as the law of trade in this

country the doctrine of competi-

tion rather than combination.

Others declared that the decision

was the greatest vindication of

State's rights ever handed down

by the court of last resort.

The climax in this instance,

coincident with the conclusion of

a great legal fight that was not

without its political phase, has

stirred the mills of political com-

ment. General Davidson is al-

ready being boomed for the Gov-

ernorship and Mr. Lightfoot for

the Attorney General's chair.

Since his election Mr. Davidson

has received probably a thousand

letters urging him to run for the

governorship and his triumph in

the State's greatest piece of litigation

has revived this insistence.
