Summer Normal at Palacios.

Bay City, Jan. 23.—The matter of the summer normal at Palacios is now definitely fixed and teachers from this section of the state may begin their preparations to go to the city by the sea during the coming June.

A meeting was held today in the office of County Judge Holman of this county, at which the following were present: County Judge W. S. Holman, who presided; Prof. J. E. Briggs, superintendent of the Eagle Lake schools; Prof. W. C. Gray, superintendent of Palacios schools; Prof. I. L. Candler, superintendent of Wharton schools; Prof. J. P. Paris, superintendent of Matagorda schools; Prof. L. T. Frizzell, superintendent of Bay City schools, and Prof. G. E. Adams, principal of Wharton schools.

It was unanimously decided to have the normal at Palacios, provided of course, that the approval of the state superintendent is obtained, and of this there is little doubt. The sessions of the normal will be held in the commodious public school building at Palacios and the people of that town have guaranteed that the maximum rate for board and lodging shall not be over \$18 per month and it will be possible to get cheaper board where desired.

Arrangements will also be made to allow those who may desire to obtain rooms and camp on the magnificent B. Y. P. U. encampment grounds. A rate of one fare and a third for the round trip, sixty-day limit, is also guaranteed. The normal will commence on June 14 and close on July 24, thus continuing six weeks.

The following instructors have already been engaged and others will also be chosen. These, with Judge Holman will constitute the executive committee: Prof. L. T. Frizzell, Bay City, conductor; Prof. J. E. Briggs, Eagle Lake, instructor; Prof. A. L. Candler, Wharton, instructor.

The advertising committee will consist of Prof. J. E. Briggs (chairman), Gray, Paris, M. M. Wolf, president of the Baptist College at Palacios, Adams, Candler and Frizzell. The normal will, if present plans materialize, embrace the following counties: Matagorda, Colorado, Wharton, Jackson, Fayette, Bastrop, Austin, Lee, Caldwell, Gonzales, Lavaca, De Witt, Victoria and Calhoun. It will, at least, take in a large number of the above mentioned counties.

It is said to be the policy of the present administration to have larger normals, and following out this policy it is hoped to have not less than 250 teachers at Palacios this summer. No better place for such a normal could be chosen, and the many advantages offered by this progressive town in the way of cool

drift, breezes, boating, fishing, bathing and all of those things that go to make summer life pleasant will be hard to equal.

A meeting of the executive committee is called to be held in Bay City on the 13th of February.

Two Stores Burglarized.

The store of J. Nathan & Son was broken into sometime during last Friday night, entrance having been gained by prizing open one of the back shutters and breaking the window glass.

Three suits of clothes, three pairs of shoes, two mufflers, some neckties and some small change that was left in the cash register were taken. The thieves might have secured other booty, though these articles are all that have been missed, and the suits of clothes were missed because all three vests were left in the store and three pairs of old shoes were left, also an old suit of gray clothes, showing that one of the burglars must have donned his new suit while in the store. Mr. Nathan stated that many other articles could have been taken and not missed, for he says, had the burglars not left the vests to each suit of clothes, neither of the three suits could have been missed from the stock.

On the same night entrance was made by burglars into the store of Burger Bros.; the front door having been prized open. Nothing was taken from this store except the cash that was left in the cash register, amounting to about ten or twelve dollars.

Mr. Burger says some other articles might have been taken though he has missed nothing else. Two gas lights were burning in the front part of the store but both lights were turned off by the burglars. The burglars are thought to have been committed by tramps, who have made good their escape, as the town was full of "hoboes" all day Friday. The officers are doing everything possible to bring the guilty parties to justice, but so far they have developed nothing.

It was also reported on the streets Monday that the wholesale house of the Schuhmacher Grocer Company had been entered by burglars during Saturday night, but Mr. Middleton, the company's manager did not confirm the report. Mr. Middleton says one of the doors was found open Sunday morning, but as nothing in the house was taken, they are of the opinion that the door must have been blown open by the high wind during the night.

Woods Gets 8 Years.

San Antonio, Tex., Jan. 22.—Eight years confinement at hard labor in the Federal penitentiary is the punishment meted out for Will P. Woods, cashier of the defunct Woods National bank, who was convicted in the Federal court last week on charge of embezzlement and misapplication of banking funds. The sentence was pronounced by Judge Maxey shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon following an all day argument of the defense in support of its motion for a new trial. The motion for a new trial was brought in the first thing following the convening of court at 9 o'clock.

The morning was consumed in arguing the points of law embraced in the first nineteen counts. Judge Maxey ruled out all the counts on points of law and announced that the points of fact would be taken up in the afternoon.

Nat B. Jones, a new member of the counsel for the defense, assumed the lead in the afternoon. Mr. Jones was endeavoring to prove that two jurors had previously to the trial expressed opinions regarding the merits of the case.

The court had previously warned the attorneys that this evidence would not be considered by him and allowed it only for use in the bill of exceptions which he said he presumed the defense would file. He then overruled both the motion for a new trial and the motion to arrest judgment.

Under the rules of procedure in a Federal court as read by Judge Maxey, the defense has thirty days after sentence in which to prepare a record of the case. They have ninety days from this date for filing their writ of error. When a citation is served after this filing, the defendant is eligible to bond. Mr. Aubrey stated that the record would be very voluminous and that the entire allotted time might be needed for its preparation. After that the writ of error will be sued out as quickly as possible.

Meanwhile Woods will rest in the county jail, where he was taken following the sentence this afternoon.

Judge Maxey said that he would fix the appeal bond at \$20,000 when the time comes to grant it.

Woods is being held under a \$25,000 bond in connection with the other two indictments, which are to be tried next May.

Fahrendhold vs. Henry Birkmann was finally decided in the supreme court Wednesday, in favor of Mrs. Fahrendhold. This was a suit by Mrs. Fahrendhold against Birkmann and his bondsmen, the parties living at Weimar, based on alleged sales of intoxicating liquors to her husband, after legal notice had been served not to make such sales. A strong fight was made in the district court of this county on the point as to whether or not the Baskin McGreggor law terminated suits on liquor dealer's bonds pending at time the law was passed. 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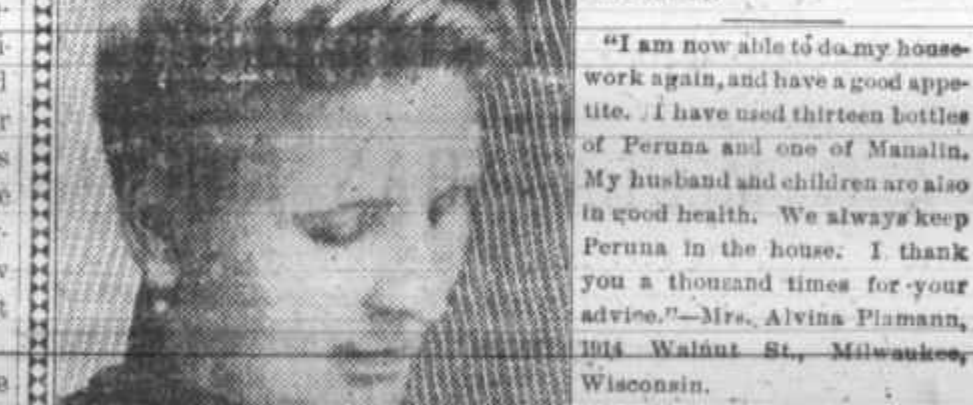
