Mr. W. A. Green was up from
Matthews Tuesday and called at
the HEADLIGHT office and advanc-
ed his subscription and also that
of his father in Tennessee to
1910, for which he has our thanks.
Mr. Green is this year engaging
in potato planting and will put
in fifty odd acres of Irish pota-
toes, having this week received a
carload of fine northern seed po-
tatoes. He tells us that Mr. Jno.
Matthews and Mr. Ned Callison
have each ordered a carload of
seed potatoes and will plant same
this season.

Mr. George Abbe and family
arrived this week from La Cross,
Kansas, and will make Eagle
Lake their future home. Mr.
Abbe has recently bought 430
acres of the Robert Walker bot-
tom land and also the Hudson
rice farm, consisting of 235 ac-
res, about a mile and a half
northeast of town. Mr. Abbe is
a well-to-do citizen and has mov-
ed to this country on account of
its superior climate. We under-
stand that he will not farm this
land himself, but for this season
will rent same to other parties.

The Hardy Satsuma and Quamquat Oranges budded onto
Citrus Trifoliata root, are receiving more serious consid-
eration by a large number of people throughout the
Coast Country than any other new industry that
has come to this country.

Large groves are being planted in many localities by the old settlers. The Nurseryman
and Horticulturist especially recommend our prairie soil with its rich, clay subsoil
for this fruit. These trees are recommended to stand a freeze or temperature of
10 degrees above zero without receiving injury. The fruit is very choice. The
trees are ornamental. Orange blossoms are nicer than roses. They add beauty,

ular appointments at the Baptist
Church at this place Saturday
evening and Sunday. He render-
ed an excellent sermon Sunday
evening, on the temperance or
prohibition question. The State
Legislature is now in session,
and within a few days, we will
know whether the prohibition
question will be submitted. It
was asked by the people at the
last election, that the lawful
right of the existence of the
saloon in the State of Texas, be
submitted to a test vote of the
people; and we cannot readily
see how such a request can be
refused by any sane body of
men, as our worthy Legislators
are. During his talk he urged
the importance of each citizen,
who is otherwise qualified to
vote, to hold a Poll Tax receipt
during the year 1909. It is only
a consideration of \$1.75, and
must be paid on or before the
last day of January. "Whether
you are for or against the sub-
mission question, you will want
to cast your vote," he said.—
