Burned to Death.

Emil Peikert, about twenty-six years of age, was burned to death in a seed house on E. Hoffman's farm, about eight miles west of Eagle Lake Monday night. Details of the affair are meager, though some are of the opinion that Peikert must have been the victim of fool play. Peikert, so we have been informed, had been to Alleyton that afternoon, and had started from there to his home. It being his intention to come to Eagle Lake the next morning to catch to Cane Belt train. Some are of the opinion that he decided not to go on home, but to sleep in the seed house, and that probably the flames started from a match or cigarette which he threw aside. His charred remains were discovered in the ashes next morning.

Sheriff Mayes Improving.

While in Columbus Wednesday, the HEADLIGHT editor called at the jail to see Sheriff Bruce Mayes, who on Monday night of last week, was assaulted by two tramps and knocked from the caboose of a freight train, falling about twenty-five feet to the ground. The caboose was standing over a culvert of about that depth at the time. Sheriff Mayes is still confined to his bed, but is now able to sit up at intervals during the day. He stated that his injuries were rapidly mending, with the exception of his hip, which is yet very painful to him, and from which he is yet unable to stand. We hope he will soon be able to be about again, for there is not a more jovial, bigger hearted man in the country than Bruce Mayes.

A young man about eighteen years of age giving his name as Jim Moore, was quite painfully hurt while attempting to catch a Sunset freight train near Mr. Raezer's place Wednesday afternoon. In attempting to board moving train, he was struck in the side by a car and knocked unconscious. City Marshal H. S. Vineyard and Mr. Weihausen went out and brought the boy into town, taking him to the Ludecke Hotel and summoning medical attention. Moore claims to be a tailor by trade; says his home is in New York where he has a brother living. He is getting along all right now, though he is still has a very severely sprained ankle.
