Mr. F. C. Scott.

DIED IN HOUSTON FEBRUARY, '09. In the death of Mr. Scott, Eagle Lake loses one of her honored and oldest citizens. On his mother's side, he descended from an old, historic English family (the Kellogs) dating his ancestors back as far as 1488.

They came to America some time prior to 1651.

One of his ancestors, Lieut. Joseph Kellogg, took a prominent part in the struggles of the New England settlers. Members of the family are prominently mentioned in the history of the French and Indian War, and also in the Revolutionary War.

His grandfather Scott came from Scotland to America about 1782 and settled in New Hampshire.

The subject of this sketch was born in Littleton, N. H., June 12, 1826. In 1852 he removed to Mass. Thence in 1869 to Nebraska where he lived up to the time of his coming to Texas in 1902.

Mr. Scott was well known by the people of Eagle Lake and lived a moral life above reproach. He had never identified himself with any church, but for some weeks before his departure he had been listening to the reading of the Bible and was much interested in his salvation. On several occasions he said to the writer that he was trusting in Jesus Christ and that He was his only hope.

Mr. Scott was the father of five children, four of whom survive him: viz. Mrs. Alice M. Farnham of North Bend, Neb., Frank J. Scott of Olympia, Washington, Mrs. Lullie Sempre of our city and Mr. Elmore J. Scott of Houston.

The many friends of the family join in sympathy for the bereaved.
