The two freezes—one on November 14th and the other on January 11th—were anything but favorable to the saccharine development of the cane. The Bonus plantation raised about three times as much cane off the same acreage this season as it ever did before, and Manager Rayner has every cause to feel proud of the showing made on the plantation at Bonus the past season and of the most successful run the Lakeside sugar refinery has ever made.
