The Santa Fe cane train, the "Whangdoodle," was taken off Wednesday, the cane season having come to a close. This train has this season handled a few cars less than five thousand of cane, having brought same from the cane fields to the Lakeside Sugar Refinery. Besides this, this train has handled five hundred and seventy-five cars of cane for Mr. Eldridge, this cane being pulled from Faber to Eagle Lake, then from here to Sartoria over the Sunset. The switch engine is still working in the yards at the mill, but it is expected to conclude its work for the season tonight. Nearly the entire force used by the Santa Fe here during the grinding season has left for Galveston and other points to take other positions with the Santa Fe. They were a fine bunch of fellows, bought lots of goods from the local merchants, and paid all bills promptly. The people of Eagle Lake were well impressed with them, and hope to see the same crew returned here next season. Conductor Reed of the Whangdoodle left for Galveston Tuesday. F. W. Henrietta, who is general superintendent of all Santa Fe trains between here and Wharton during grinding season, will return to Galveston Monday. "Henry" is a fellow, always jolly and full of fun, with a smile and kind word for every one he meets. We regret to see him leave, but hope he will return to Eagle Lake next season.
