Synopsis of Commissioners' Court
Proceedings of the Febru-
ary Term, 1909.

In the matter of the petition of
J. J. Potter et al. for a first-class
road from Nada to Wharton county
line:

It appearing to the court that
the order entered on the 15th
day of May, 1908, establishing
this road, is illegal for the reason
that there are several minor chil-
dren interested in the ownership
of the land over which said road
passes who have not been served
with notice, as the law provides,
it is therefore ordered that the
order purporting to establish
said road be set aside and vacated
and the matter be again referred
to the following jury of view,
to-wit: Ferdinand Popp, John
Goerhmann, Frank Arnold, John
Boernisch and Joseph Hemmi,
with instruction to give legal no-
tice to each and every person
owning an interest in the land
over which the road passes and
to report thereon at the next
term of the court.

In the matter of the petition of
Wm. Reichardt et al. to raise the
Columbus, Cummins Creek via

the matter of the petition of
John Emmel et al. for a new
road, it appearing to the court
that the damages awarded to
Daniels is uncertain, the matter
is therefore referred back to the
jury of view to act on it and re-
port again at the next term of
the court.

The report of the jury of view
in the matter of the petition of
John Ritter et al. action was de-
ferred thereon until the next term
of the court.

It is ordered that Commissioner
Leyendecker be authorized to
have the Cummins Creek bridge
at the Rothenberg crossing
cleaned and painted to the best
interest of the county and that
the barrel of paint at the county
farm be sent up there for that
purpose.

The court entered into contract
with J. O. Tanner to repair and
set up a 40 foot bridge span out
of the iron and steel at the Col-
umbus east bridge, for the sum
of \$45. The said Tanner is to
make all necessary shop repairs
and to furnish all missing pieces
necessary to make the span com-
plete.

Tax Collector W. B. Fehren-
kamp presented his quarterly
report as such officer, which was
examined and approved by the
court.

County Treasurer Jos. Burt-
schell presented his quarterly
report as such officer, which was
examined and approved.

County Clerk John Hasted
presented his quarterly report
of the finance ledger, which was
examined and approved by the
court.

County Physician C. A. Wil-
liamson presented his quarterly
report, which was examined and
approved.

Dr. C. A. Williamson reported
to the court the existence of
small pox near the town of Glid-
den, whereupon it is ordered
that the said county physician be
authorized to take the necessary
steps to keep the cases isolated
and to prevent spreading of the
disease, and to report his action
thereon.

It is ordered that an account
be kept with each road gang
showing fully all expenses in-
curred by each respectively. And
the county judge is directed to
open up such account in a book
suitable for the purpose and
showing a fair, full and complete
statement of such expenses.

In the matter of the petition of
M. Harter et al. for a first-class
public road, beginning in the
Columbus and Cheetham public
road, Tom Byars, Connie
Byars, Will Tait, Harry Walker
and Lee Johnson were appointed
a jury of view to lay out said road
and to report at the next term
of this court.

In the matter of the petition of
August Johnson et al. for a first-
class public road from the south
corner of section No. 17 to the
town of Eagle Lake, J. R. West-
moreland, W. E. Welford, A. C.
McClanahan, John Thatcher, Jr.,
and M. D. Flowers were appoint-
ed a jury of view to lay out said
road and to report at the next
term of this court.

Engineer T. L. Smith present-
ed his report on the work of ele-
vating the approach of the Col-
umbus east bridge as performed
by Contractor G. R. Pickard,
and after due consideration of
said report and the claims of
Contractor Pickard, it was order-
ed that the sum of \$1,540 be paid
to said Pickard in full settlement
of same, and that a warrant for
said amount be issued.

Commissioner T. J. Roberts
was appointed to go to Baylor
county to investigate and report
on the county school lands, as to
whether or not it is advisable to
place same upon the market, and
to report thereon as soon as con-
venient.

Report of jury of view in the

Grabow et al. for a change of
public road, same was adopted
and road changed.
