Beautiful Columbus.

Visitors to Columbus in recent years have invariably left with a good impression of Colorado county, and it is safe to say a great many investments have been made as a result of the action of our worthy commissioners' court in beautifying the courthouse square. The condition of the public buildings and grounds is always an indication of the degree of refinement predominant in any locality. It is almost true that the many pretty homes and the well-kept yards and streets are an index to be relied upon by those seeking homes in Colorado county. Having many natural advantages, such as drainage, beautiful live oak trees, and slightly location, Columbus will always be an ideal place to live, and while she recognizes Weimar's excellence as a general farming locality and

Eagle Lake's superiority as a rice center, the land in the vicinity of Columbus is especially adapted for truck and fruit raising; and, while to raise truck and fruit for profit it is necessary to raise it in large quantities, so as to ship in carload lots, it is only a question of time when enough people will engage in the business to make it pay handsomely. There is no reason why we cannot raise oranges, figs and berries equally as well as the Alvin district, which ships carload after carload to Northern markets every year. Onions can be grown here just as abundantly as at Laredo and Colulla, at which places the onion crop is looked upon as the only real money-maker.

Melons of all kinds, tomatoes—in fact, garden truck of any kind will do as well here as at Jacksonville or Tyler. All we need is

enough industrious truck and fruit farmers to justify the forming of co-operative associations with a definite plan in view for each season's work. This is all a matter of evolution and we are confident Columbus will ultimately be one of the most prosperous cities in the Coast country.

As an illustration of the confidence displayed by some of our most progressive citizens, attention is called to the marked change in the past three years in the general appearance of Columbus. The Hamburger & Son building, which would be a credit to any city; the fine brick store buildings erected by Messrs. Gegenworth, Matter and Williamson; the repainting and remodeling of many of the business homes; the beautiful new homes of Messrs. W. E. Bridge, J. J. Mansfield, Geo. Gegenworth, L. F. Dick and C. R. Grobe; the new Baptist church now being built opposite the court house square, the plans and specifications of which indicate it will be the handsomest and most convenient church in the county; the court house square, with its cement and gravel walks, beautiful flowers and shrubbery, its carpet of green, dotted here and there with palms, magnolias, midget cedars, banana and orange trees, its pretty fountains, the stately walnut and hackberry trees standing guard over all, and the marked improvement in our streets by our able commissioner, J. J. Odom, whose untiring energy has accomplished much in inspiring our citizens to beautify their yards and lawns. Those who seldom get away from Columbus can hardly appreciate this beautiful city, but let's not be content with the knowledge that it is the prettiest city of its size in Texas. Let's encourage homeseekers to try their lot with us. Let's try to get someone interested in the erection of a creamery, cotton mill, oil mill, box factory or any other enterprise which, if properly managed, would be a success here. In the meantime, let's give praise to those of our citizens who are making our public buildings, business blocks, homes and streets attractive and inviting to those in search of a desirable place to live, and if any of us have been thoughtless in the general appearance of our homes, we should profit by the examples set before us and strive to make our little city as perfect as it is possible to be made.—Stafford Bank News.
