An Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City

Council of the City of Eagle Lake,

Texas, that it shall be unlawful

for any person or persons to op-

erate any train, cars or locomot-

ive within the corporate limits

of the City of Eagle Lake at a

greater rate of speed than six

miles an hour. Any person vio-

lating the provisions of this or-

dinance shall be deemed guilty

of a misdemeanor and on con-

viction shall be fined in any amount

not less than Five Dollars and not

exceeding Twenty Five Dollars,

and each separate act shall be

deemed a separate offense. All

ordinances in conflict with any

of the provisions of this ordi-

nance shall be and the same are

hereby repealed.
