THE LAKESIDE RICE IRRIGATION COM'Y.

Is the Name of the Newly Organized Company Which Has Purchased and Taken Over the Property of the Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation Company.

The Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation company has been purchased and taken over by the Lakeside Rice Irrigation company, which has been organized with the following directors: R. Winterman, J. H. August Meyer, H. W. Rayner, John J. Raezer, and C. F. Rayner. They elected the following officers to serve the ensuing year: R. Wintermann, president; H. W. Rayner, vice-president and treasurer; John J. Raezer, secretary and manager. In the purchase of the Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation company, the newly organized Lakeside Rice Irrigation company did not purchase the rice lands, but bought all pumping plants, right of ways, laterals, canals, the Colorado river pumping plant and all such other property formerly owned by the Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation company.

The new company which has already assumed control of the irrigation business, has been incorporated and chartered under the laws of the state. It is a very strong financial concern, capable of financing anything it may undertake, and great improvements along all lines will be made on the company's property. Mr. Wintermann, the president, is a wealthy and influential business man of St. Louis. Mr. Rayner, vice-president and treasurer of the newly formed company, is well known in this section, being general manager of the big Lakeside Sugar Refining company and also manager of the extensive interests of that company in Wharton county, and a successful manager of large business institutions, his name can not be found in this section. Mr. Rayner will be a valuable man to the company. The secretary and manager, Mr. Jno. J.
