We are unanimously in favor that the said fund shall be equally divided among the several Commissioners' precincts, also it is our desire that the farmers' labor and teams shall be used as far as practicable as the roads will be built solely in the interest and for the advantage of the citizens of each precinct.

Referring to the above subject, the proposed bond issue, we are of the opinion that the majority of the people in this section of the county are unaware that an election for such an issue has been ordered, as nothing concerning the ordering of the election has been published, or even posted, in these parts and surely the people of this section—especially the country people who look to their local paper for information on such subjects—should be treated with this much consideration. When is this election called for? The people in this end of the county want to know. Such an important step as this, where the peoples' money is concerned, should be published in every paper in the county that the people in all parts of the county could post themselves and become aware of the fact this election, which if it carries, will raise their tax rate 15 cents on every \$100, has been ordered. This question should be made so public that every farmer in every part of the county can get familiar with the subject.

Could turn out and vote, and let the result of the election be the will of the whole people of the county. We learn that the election has been set for next month.

Almost upon us, and we venture the assertion that half the people of Colorado county—yes, two thirds of them, don't know that this election has been ordered. Such an important measure as this should not be "railroaded" through without first being advertised thoroughly in all parts of the county. This paper does not intend to do this.

ing opposed to good roads. We need good roads. Every community needs good roads. But this paper does want to go on record as being conservative in all things, and it wants to be conservative in this issue. Don't go into the issue blind-folded. The commissioners in the above say they are "in favor that the said funds shall be equally divided among the several commissioners' precincts," but isn't it a fact that it has been previously published in Colorado county papers that after a shell road had been built through the county from east to west that the "remainder" of the money would be equally divided among the four commissioners' precincts? Anyhow, let the people see the printed official election call. Surely it tells just how this money is to be expended, and then the people will know just what they are voting for. This election, we are told, is set for March, and is for the issuing of bonds to the amount of \$250,000 to be used in building good roads in Colorado county. If this election carries the issuance of these bonds will increase the county tax rate 15 cents on every \$100 valuation of taxable property in the county. The object of this article is that the paper wants every reader to give this matter careful consideration, then ask yourself if you are willing to place a further tax of 15 cents on the \$100 valuation in order to have the roads made better. Will you farm or what? ever your business is, justify it. Good roads are a fine thing. That's an undisputed fact, but the question that confronts us is this: Considering the fact last year is the first year—

and that the state and county tax is already 57 1/2 cents on every \$100 valuation, do we want to vote this extra tax upon ourselves? Look the matter squarely in the face before you vote an extra tax upon yourself that you might regret after it is too late. The question is: Are we ready for this issue just at this time? Another question the HEADLIGHT would like to know is this: Who is to vote in this election? Surely it should be an election solely of tax payers, and not "just any man who owns a watch or gun."

We would like to know how many people there are in Colorado county who are paying taxes on a watch or a gun and nothing else? Echo answers HOW many? This should be an election of tax payers pure and simple, for what right has a man who pays no taxes to say what shall be done with tax payers' money? At this election property tax receipts should be required just the same as poll tax receipts. Election judges don't take the word of the voter for his poll tax receipt. He must produce it before he can vote. And just as it should be in this election, the voter should be required to produce his property tax receipt, to show that he is a tax payer, before he be allowed to cast a vote in the ballot box that says how the tax payers' money shall be spent.
