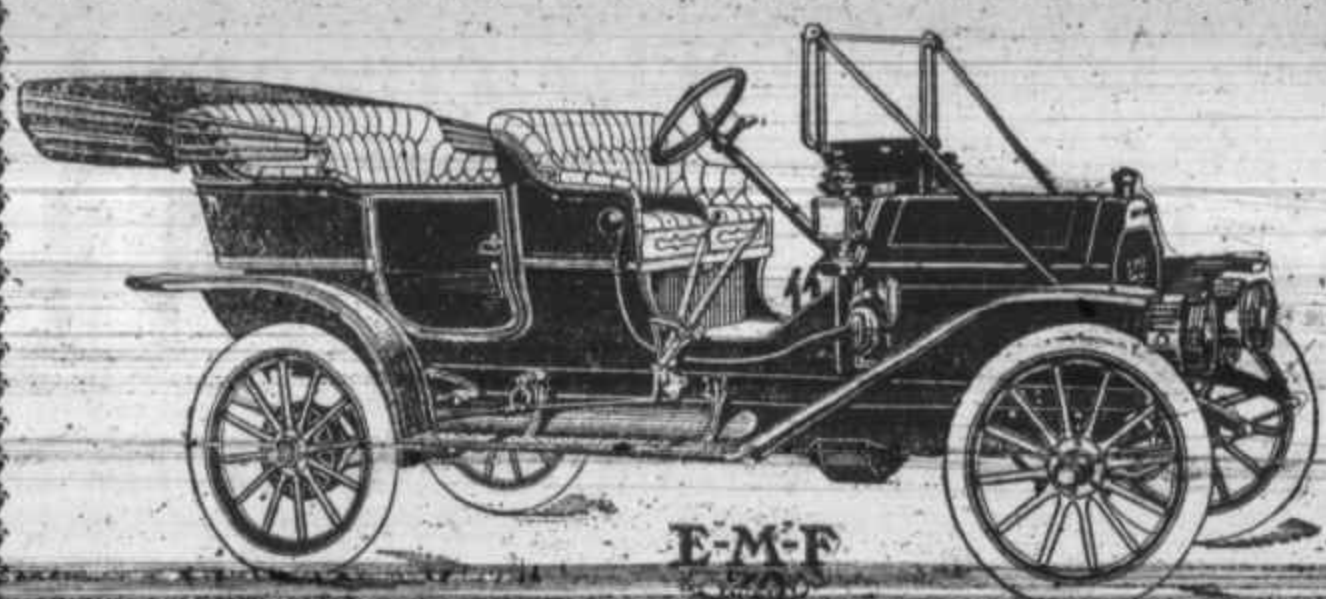

**COLORADO COUNTY IS NOT READY FOR BOND ISSUE.**

This bond issue question which now confronts the taxpayers of Colorado county is a question that concerns every tax payer in the county. It is a question in which every tax payer and property owner in the county has a right to his own opinion. It is a question that should be freely discussed before the election. The HEADLIGHT has the greatest respect and esteem for those who oppose it in this bond issue. They have a perfect right to their opinion in this matter and this paper does not censure them in the least for their opinions, but this paper does ask that it be treated with that same consideration. Just because this paper differs from "a few" in this great question which concerns every citizen in Colorado county is no reason for a personal falling out with a single one of them. We hope to retain the friendship of every one on the opposing side long after this election is over and forgotten. We intend to handle this matter without gloves, but it is not our intention, in any instance, to make it a personal one. We hope to fall out with no one on account of our views on this subject, and we regret exceedingly that some have seen fit to allow little personalities to creep into the campaign such that their job printing orders were sent to another town just because the HEADLIGHT dares to come out openly and express its views in the matter. Be that as it will, we believe that a newspaper that has not the moral courage to express its opinion on such a subject as this, when it thinks its side is to the interest of the farmers and the masses of the people of this county, is not worthy of the name of newspaper and is not worth a red penny with a hole in it to the community in which it is published. This paper does not believe that Colorado county is ready for this bond issue at this time and it does not hesitate to say so. The people of Eagle Lake have but recently voted an extra tax upon themselves for the new school building. That was something we needed. The HEADLIGHT favored that bond issue. The paper said so and its editor voted for it. But the HEADLIGHT does not favor this bond issue for \$250,000, because it does not believe the county is ready for it.

First: The Eagle Lake school district has but recently voted an extra tax on the tax payers for the new school building. Second: The people of Garwood have but recently voted bonds for a new school building. Third: The people of Rock Island have just voted \$10,000 bonds for a new school building. Fourth: The people of the Columbus school district have just voted an additional tax upon themselves for the maintenance of a nine months' free school. Fifth: The

that this money shall be divided equally for road work among the four Commissioners' precincts. Right here in this connection we say that the originator of the bond issue and one of the staunchest supporters of the bond issue and appeared in this paper of issue of November 19th, 1910, says thus: "The plan proposed in this bond issue should be built entirely across the county east and west, giving all parts of the county good drive ways to Columbus, and to divide the balance amounting to some \$20,000, for each precinct, among the several precincts where most needed." The HEADLIGHT does not believe that there is any possibility for such an expensive road, not just at this time at any rate.

Mr. B. Leysant, one of Alletton's prominent and substantial citizens, was here on business Monday. Mr. Leysant stated that he did not think the order for the bond issue election had been sufficiently advertised in all parts of the county, and that he did not think that at this time the county was ready for it.

A rather peculiar coincidence connected with the meeting of the bond issue supporters held here Monday afternoon was that there were only eleven present and six of them were autoists.
