JIM BARNETT SERIOUSLY INJURED AT BEEVILLE.

Jim Barnett, a barber at the
Warwell shop, was struck over
the head with a stick of stove
wood in the hands of a negro
back of the Bond restaurant,
which adjoins the barber shop,
Tuesday afternoon, the blow
knocking him down and very
nearly killing him, cutting a long
and deep gash in his scalp. The
negro is employed at the restau-
rant. His brother also works
there. One of them had been
feeding Mr. Barnett's bird dog
for some time and it was while
paying for the service and re-
questing that the dog be fed
again that the trouble started.

The brother of the one who has
been feeding the dog put in and
later when he came outside Mr.
Barnett began to beat him with
a club for his "saas." The other
negro then hit Mr. Barnett over
the head from behind and either
struck or kicked him after he
was down. But for the timely
arrival of Felix Hart and Amos
Mussett, Mr. Barnett believed
the negroes would have killed him.
They ran but were captured.
They are sons of Walker Canada.
Mr. Barnett had his injuries
dressed and was on the streets
yesterday, but will not be able
to work for some time. Beeville
has the case.
