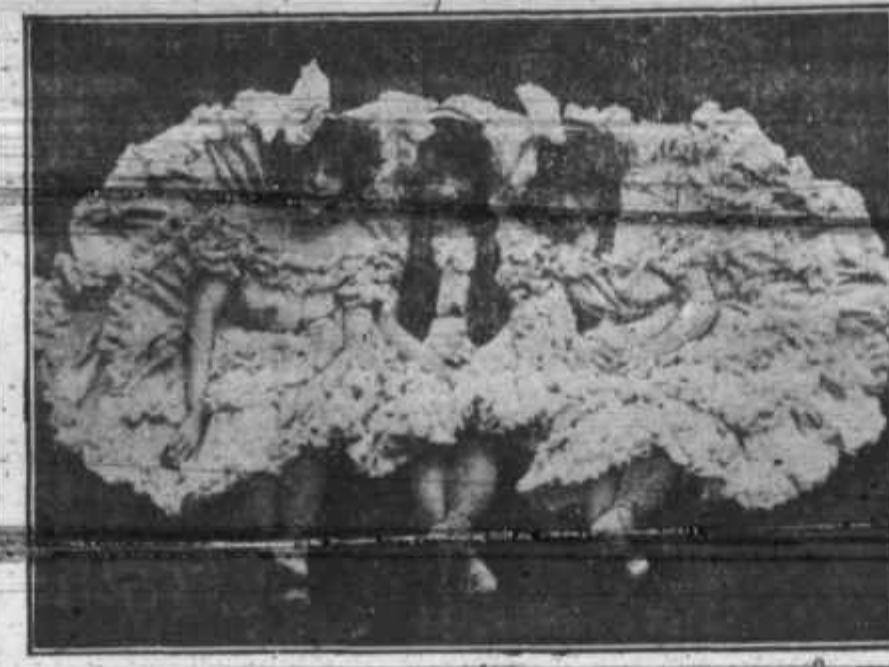

The value of woman's clubs has frequently been questioned, sometimes in high places, but the council of these organizations in Kansas City has taken upon itself a service that promises large benefit to an important social class. It proposes to place a notice in every railroad station in Missouri asking every country girl coming to that city for work or study to notify some woman's club two weeks in advance, when efforts will be made to secure work for her, if necessary, or in any event, to put her in touch with safe associations and wholesome influences. In these days the value of such assistance is obvious.

The Mexican Revolution.

The suppression, of and censorship over, actual conditions by the Mexican Government no longer avails and Washington has been officially advised that enormous amounts of arms and ammunition and men are crossing from this side of the Rio Grande, and Washington has ordered the army to take the border. Under our neutrality laws the step is eminently right—but what is Mexico doing to prevent the landing of these men and arms? Why depend upon the United States to arrest the progress of the revolutionists? The trouble has assumed such dimensions that neutral powers can no longer consider it inaction. It's a revolution and the "rebels" have as much right to fight for liberty and against oppression as the American people had to fight to throw off the English yoke.

Our Texas Legislature has made a grave error in drafting resolutions to the Mexican Government embodying the assurance that Texas has no sympathy for the revolutionists but the Senate has wisely held it up pending development. Should those people, now in a life and death struggle for liberty and for rights for the ballot succeed (which we believe they will) how would they feel toward Texas?

Our lawmakers lack judgment and also knowledge of Texas sentiment.—West Texas News.
