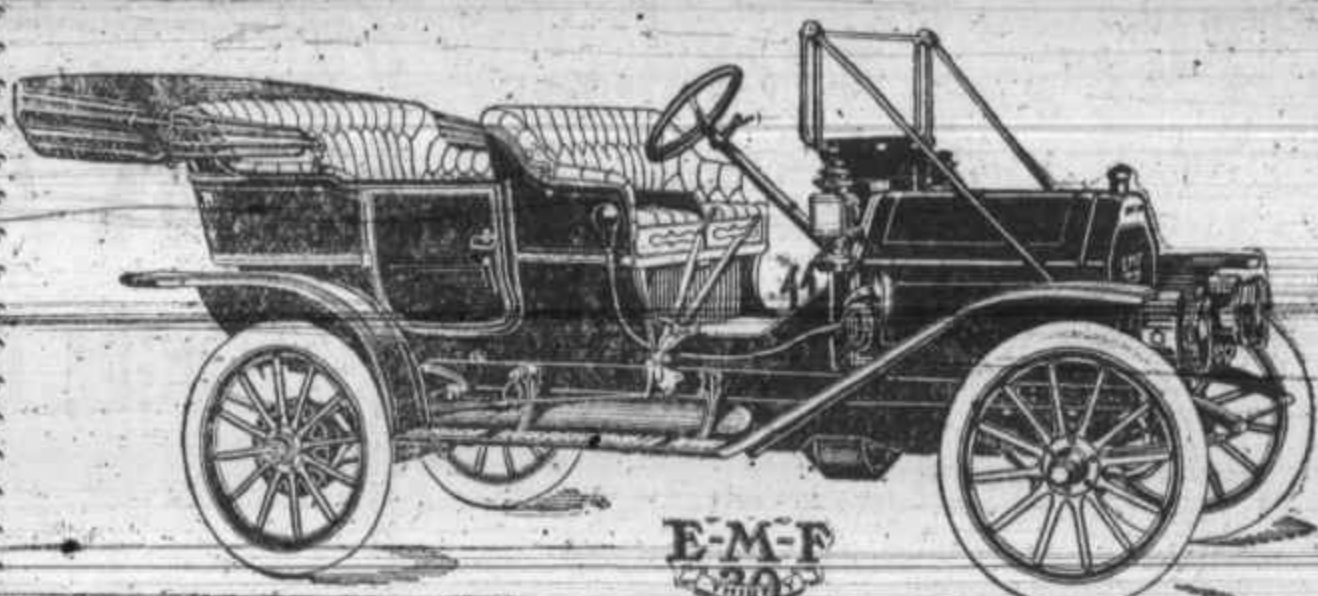

CITY ORDERS BOND ELECTION FOR WATERWORKS AND SEWERAGE.

At the meeting of the city council Tuesday night it was decided to order an election on May 10th to determine whether or not bonds in the sum of \$30,000 shall be issued for putting in a sewerage system and waterworks plant. The mayor and members of the council are of the opinion that the extra tax which will be required for this work will be saved in insurance, as the system of waterworks which the city proposes putting in will be in accordance with the insurance laws in every instance and thereby will be the means of lowering the insurance rate in Eagle Lake. The members of the council, in discussing the matter say that Mr. Koenecke is doing the best that he possibly can with the present waterworks under present conditions, but the mayor and entire board of aldermen are of the opinion that the present system of waterworks does not meet the requirements, and thus they have called an election to determine whether or not the city shall establish a waterworks plant in connection with a sewerage system.

FIRE AT ROCK ISLAND THURSDAY MORNING DOES \$23,000 DAMAGE.

Fire, the origin of which is not known, swept the greater portion of the business houses at Rock Island Thursday morning at an early hour. The fire started at about 1:30 o'clock in the morning and owing to the strong south wind that prevailed the buildings burned rapidly, burning shingles flew far, and it looked for a time as though the entire business district would be swept away, and but for the heroic work of the volunteer bucket and ladder brigade, the damage would have been considerably more than it is. The total loss is estimated at about \$22,750. The individual losses are as follows:
M. Rigg, general merchandise, total loss, partially covered by insurance; postoffice fixtures total loss; part of mail and valuable papers saved.
Rock Island Supply Co., J. B. Small proprietor, groceries and feed, and 1500 bushels of peanuts, total loss. Partially covered by insurance.
Waldvogel & Friedman, dry goods and gent's furnishings, total loss; partially insured.
J. M. Slaven, furniture, most of furniture saved; partially insured.
at Slaven's furniture store, part of fixtures damaged.
Max Altman, harness and saddlery, most of stock saved; some, insurance.
