THIS TOWN NEEDS A NEW SCHOOL BUILDING. (Written by Estelle Wright, 9th Grade.)

Since this building was constructed the town has increased very much in size. The one we have now was partly built fifteen years ago when the population was not much over fifty people, while now it is about six hundred. This shows, plainly that the same building should not be used for one hundred and fifty pupils that was intended for seventy-five. For the last two terms it has been necessary to rent an extra room for the third and fourth grades. The room is small and altogether unsatisfactory for a school room. This also proves that a new and larger building is needed. This building is not fire-proof or very strong for a few years ago it was badly wrecked in a storm and it would not hardly stand another. If a new building is constructed, it will be made fire-proof and very strong so that if a storm came during school hours, it would not be danger-

ous for the pupils to be in. At present there are only four teachers employed, which makes the work equally divided. When the new building is completed, it will contain six rooms and one more teacher will be employed, also another grade added to the course. In this way the work could be easily divided, giving each teacher two grades which would make the work more satisfactory, for the teachers would have time to prepare each lesson while now there are so many grades in one room that it is impossible for them to prepare every lesson as they should be prepared.

EIGHTH DISTRICT MEDICAL ASSOCIATION. "Medicine Men" Held an Interesting and Profitable Meeting Here Tuesday.

The Eighth District Medical Association met in Eagle Lake Tuesday. Owing to the rain, only a few physicians and their families were present. The attendance was much smaller than it would otherwise have been. The scientific session was taken up first, as some of the visitors who had papers read, were compelled to return on the afternoon train. Two papers were read and discussed before the afternoon train. One was by Dr. M. G. Calhoun, on "Cancer of the Stomach," read by Prof. James E. Thompson of Galveston on the "Indications for Operation after Jujus to the Spinal Cord." Each of these Doctors has a national reputation for skill and ability in their profession and as either lives in the district, it was quite a compliment to have them meet with us and give us their rich experience and research in these particular fields.

Dr. Walter Shropshire of Yukon, who never fails to attend the meetings and to contribute from a rich store of knowledge, his full quota of scientific instruction, read a splendid paper on "The Diagnosis of Influenza." Dr. W. H. Lancaster of Gano read what was declared to be the most elaborate paper ever written on the subject of "Gonorrhoea in Women." Dr. P. E. Parker of City closed the afternoon

session with a paper on "The Value of the Urinary Excretion in the Diagnosis of Gonorrhoea." We would have been glad for the people to hear this paper, as it would have given them an insight into some of the limitations of the pleasures and some of the heart aches of the doctors. The banquet was sandwiched in the hiatus between the afternoon and night session. But don't associate this supper in your minds with sandwiches, for it was out of sight, or most of it was so placed presently. As a caterer, you can trust Mr. Hanly implicitly. After supper adjournment was had to the Airdone. After an invocation by Rev. Oscar Ferrell, Dr. J. K. Davidson addressed the visitors in a brief but very eloquent speech, that made them feel as if life would have been not worth while to every man, woman and child in Eagle Lake, if it were not for him. This was a public session, the main feature of which was the President, Dr. A. L. Lincecum's stereopticon views and lecture on "The Common Methods of Spreading Disease." President Lincecum not only vilified the fly and mosquito and proved them outlaws and common enemies worthy of death, but he got out with his camera and prepared unforgettable object lessons of a few of the recruiting stations we maintained around our premises for the breeding of these pests. He would have been amused next day to see some of the cleaning up that was done. It is safe to say that his demonstration will continue to bear fruit that will be death to flies, mosquitoes and vermin. No community could invest money more profitably than to have him show it the fearful loss of

life and money besides the suffering, that could be easily prevented by cleaning up and keeping clean. This finished the session except the usual felicitations between hosts and guests. The places represented were Galveston, Houston, Bay City, El Campo, Gano, Yukon, Weimar, Flatonia, Palacios, Garwood and Leonardville, Kansas.
