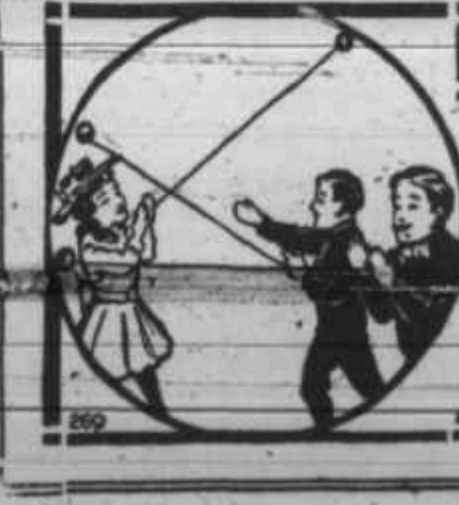
Mr. W. C. Sanders, the "Chicken King" of Altair, was in the city Wednesday.
