Sam Balke Killed.

Sam Balke, about 35 years of age, was shot and killed about 9:40 o'clock Tuesday night at his home in Lissie. His wife and Burnie Herring, about 17 years old, her son by a former marriage, are alleged to have done the killing. Four shots in all were fired two inside the house and two on the front gallery, three taking effect, one shot from a 38-caliber revolver taking effect about three or four inches above the left groin, one from the same caliber pistol in the right groin, and his right arm was almost severed by a charge of No. 4 shot from a shot gun. The first ones to arrive at the scene of the trouble found the deceased lying in a pool of blood on the front gallery. He died in about an hour and a half after the shooting. From loss of blood
