Editor: I noticed an article in
the last issue of the Headlight
saying that it would be a good
thing if the river pumping plant
could start up and keep water in
the lake. Just want to tell you
that the river plant has been
running and throwing a 30-inch
stream for the last two weeks
and we expect to keep water in
the lake during the season.

that we believe ninety-nine per
cent of the people of Eagle Lake
will join us in saying that we
hope they realize their "expecta-
tions" and keep water in the
lake during the season and leave
it full after the season is over—
even though it will be the first
time. If the lake could be kept
full of water all the time and not
pumped dry every summer, as
it has been in the past, it would
soon be the biggest drawing
card that our city has. Many
have been the expressions of the
citizens lately about what a fine
thing it would be for the city. If
the lake could be allowed to once
more become the fine fishing and
pleasure resort of old. One gen-
tleman, when probably half a
dozen or more men were talking
on the possibilities of finding
some means to keep the lake
full—like it used to be in days
gone by—last Saturday after-
noon, remarked: that the lake, if
left entirely full of water, would
become an excellent fishing place
again in one year's time. Another
remarked that when the lake
was always full of water the gen-
eral health of Eagle Lake was a
great deal better than any time
since.

valuation of the state and national
banks of the county, and after nearly two days consumed
the court adjourned at 7:30 p. m., and
value all of them at 75 per
cent of the book value of their
capital stock, plus the surplus on
hand on January 1st.

Applying this scale the incor-
porated banks were valued as
follows:
First Nat'l of Eagle Lake.....\$62,125
Eagle Lake State.....48,750
Farmers & Merchants.....30,000
First State, Weimar.....19,500
Rock Island State.....7,500
Garwood State.....7,500
Provident State.....7,500

The banks were represented
before the court by Fox Step-
hens, M. E. Gwynn and J. E.
Roberts, of Eagle Lake and Wil-
liam Miller of Weimar.—Colum-
bia Citizen.

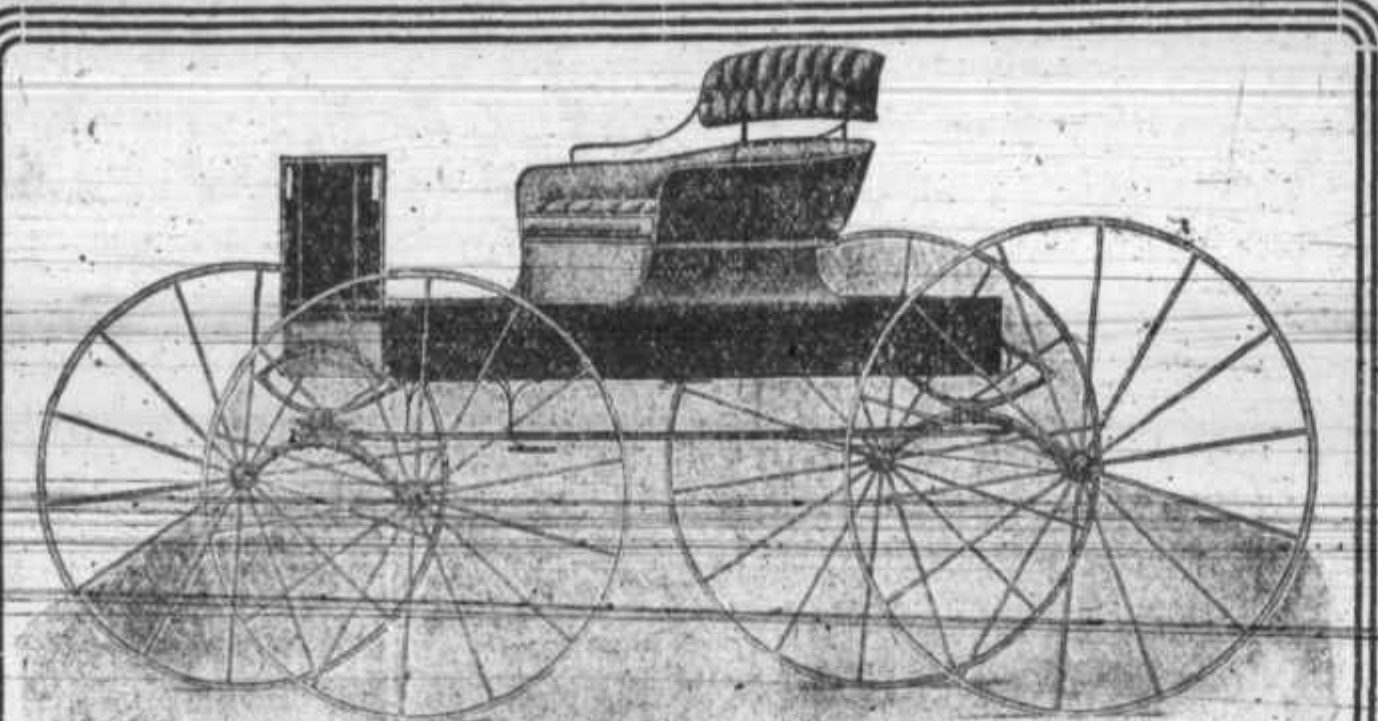
