### Death of Mrs. Hugh Matlock.

A mantle of sorrow was thrown over our little city when the sad message was received here Sunday morning that Mrs. Ruth Buffington Matlock was dead. She died at the Baptist Sanitarium in Houston at 9 o'clock Sunday morning; age 25 years, 5 months and 19 days. Mrs. Matlock, who was Miss Ruth Buffington of this city, was married on the 27th of last April to Mr. Hugh Matlock of Texas City. About a week later she was taken ill from which she never recovered, her death being due to peritonitis. Mrs. Matlock was a most estimable lady, and her sweet disposition and gentle manner have won her popularity wherever she has gone. She was a bright, intellectual, sweet and unassuming young woman, just in the bloom of life. At the time she contracted the fatal illness she was a teacher in the Texas City high school. Mrs. Matlock was formerly a teacher in the Eagle Lake school a few years ago and previous to this time taught the school at Garwood. She was a most devoted and loving daughter, and idolized by her parents, brothers and sisters. The remains were shipped to Eagle Lake Sunday night. The funeral services were held at the family home in this city at half past four o'clock Monday afternoon, with interment in the Lakeside cemetery. Rev. Mr. Tracy, the local Methodist pastor, officiating. Besides a grief-stricken mother and father and a heart-broken young husband, she leaves three sisters, Mrs. O. R. Davis, Misses Nida and Nellie, and four brothers, George, Dan, Dick and John, to mourn her death.
