Thatcher.

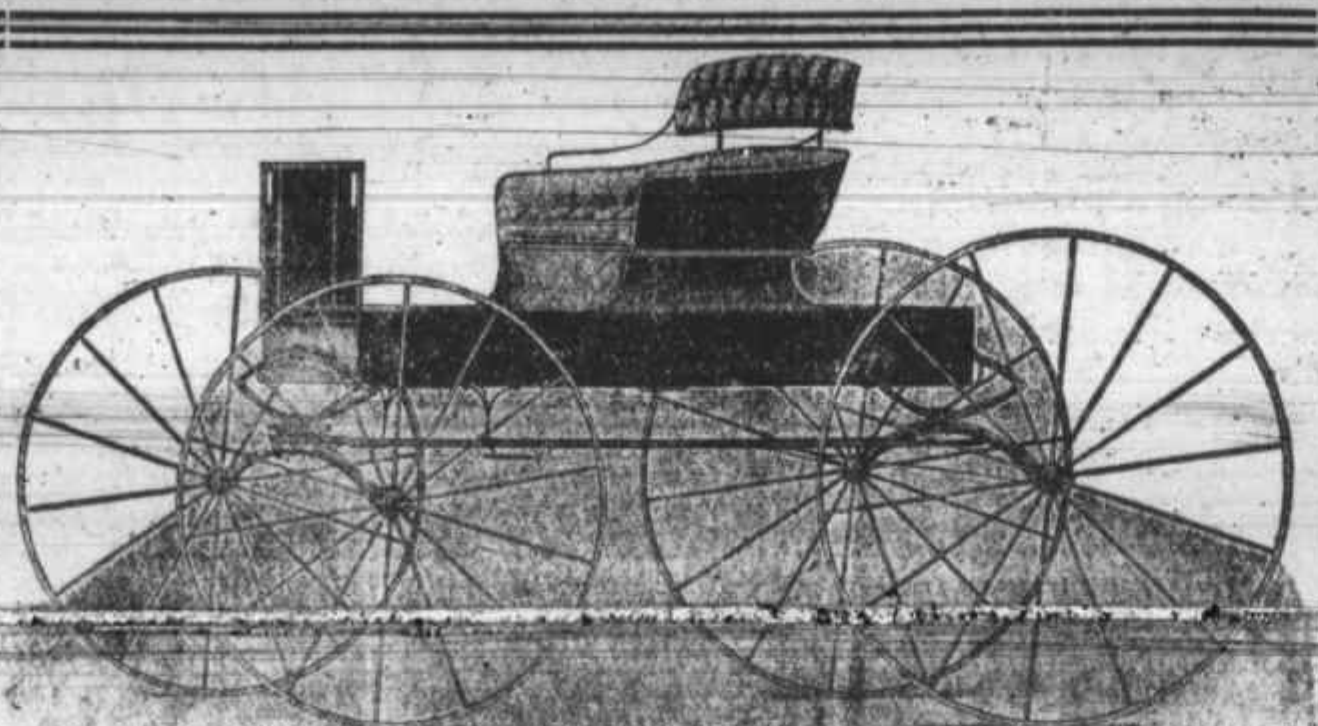

Mexican Woman Horribly Burned to Death.

Wednesday evening about six
o'clock the fire alarm was given
and the fire company rushed to
a house in the Westmoreland Ad-
dition, across the Aransas Pass
railroad near the McClanahan
lumber yards, the house having
become ignited from flames
caused by an explosion from an
oil can. The flames, however,
had been extinguished before
the arrival of the fire company.
The house was occupied by a
Mexican family. The woman,
Blanca Garcia, about forty-five
years old, and a very fleshy
woman, was in the act of start-
ing a fire in the kitchen stove to
get supper, using kerosene oil in
making the fire, when the explo-
sion occurred. It is presumed
that the gasses from the oil be-
came ignited from live coals in
the stove when the oil was pour-
ed into the stove. The oil can
which she held in her hand was
completely blown to pieces, only
the handle of the can being found
after the accident. The woman
and entire room were enveloped
in a mass of flames in a second.
The stove was not damaged. It
is believed by some that the un-
fortunate woman by mistake
must have used gasoline instead
of kerosene which caused the fa-
tal explosion. She was horribly
burned. Her hair burned off,
her face unrecognizable, and her
body one mass of painful burns.
She died at 2 o'clock Thursday
morning after eight hours of in-
tense suffering. The slight wit-
nesses by those who were first
to answer the alarm was a hor-
rible and pitiful one. There
was hardly a spot as large as a
dollar on the woman's entire
body that was not burned, and
the skin began to peel from her
face, arms and body within a
few minutes after the awful ac-
cident, making the sight all the
more gruesome. She was the
mother of four children, the el-
dest twenty-four years and the
youngest nine. One of her sons
is employed at the ice plant.

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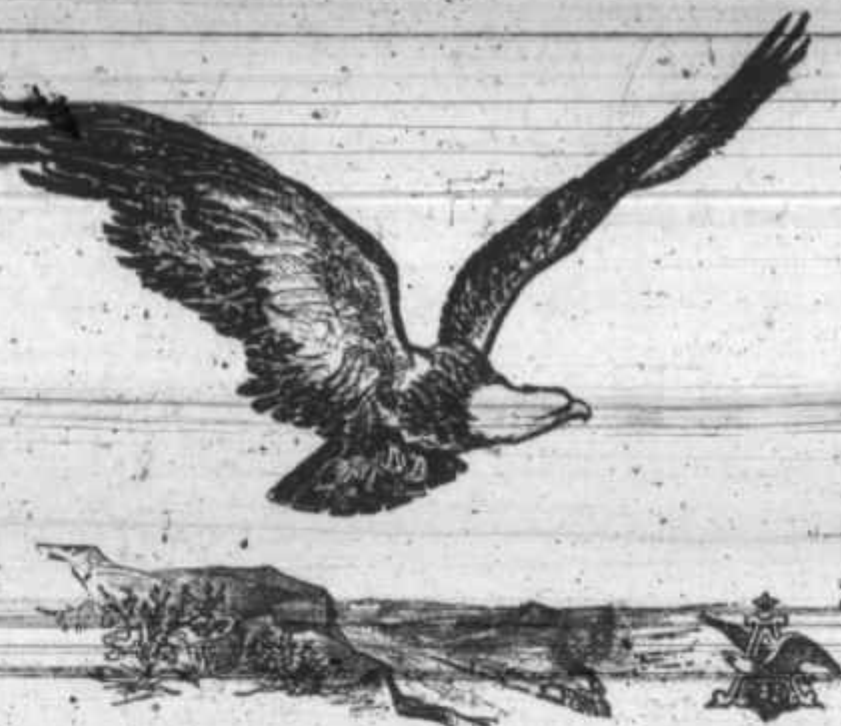
