Once a Beautiful Lake But Now A Swamp, Prolific Breeder of Malarial Germs.

A few years ago, Eagle Lake
from which the town derives its
name, had a reputation through-
out this section for being a re-
sort for health and enjoyment.
Ample opportunity was afforded
to visitors from the surrounding
country to annually spend a sea-
son of rest and recreation upon
its waters and along its shaded
shores. It was the Mecca for
sportsmen who came accompa-
nied by their wives and families
camping and amusing themselves
in hunting, boating and fishing.
The lake, a body of open water
two miles long and one mile
wide, bordered by handsome
liveoaks shading a gravelly beach
was a most desirable camping
ground and it was customary
for visitors and citizens of the
town to have here their picnics,
barbecues, etc., serving to bring
the people together in social and
familiar intercourse, strength-
ening the ties of friendship and
enabling them to forget for a
while the cares and responsibil-
ities of actual life. In the spring
and summer seasons the lake
presented a lovely sight with its
surface carpeted with the bloom
of the lilies, its waters dotted
here and there with boats filled
with ladies and children amus-
ing themselves fishing and gath-
ering flowers. The scene is now
all changed. What a contrast be-
tween its present and former
condition. That once beautiful
sheet of water that afforded to
the people so much pleasure and
enjoyment has now lapsed into
the semblance of a swamp, a
prolific breeder of malarial
germs, a habitation for alliga-
tors and mosquitoes.

Cannot something be done to
restore its famous attractive con-
ditions?
Would not it be to the advan-
tage of the business men to take
this matter up? Investigate the
titles, have the lines surveyed
by a competent surveyor and if
possible make some arrange-
ments by purchase or otherwise
by which a restoration can be
made for the benefit of the pub-
lic. The revenue derived from
increase of business and en-
hancement of values would far
exceed that which our mer-
chants realize from the cultiva-
tion of rice.
