

Depot at Matthews Burned.

The Santa Fe (Cane Belt) depot at Matthews, six miles below here, was burned yesterday morning about half past eight o'clock. Agent E. P. Davis states that he burned some waste paper in the stove about 8 o'clock in the morning and about 8:30 the fire was discovered in the roof of the building. There being no water handy the entire building burned in about thirty minutes. Agent Davis states that he saved most of his records from the fire. There was some loss of property. The depot was insured by the Santa Fe's entire property is covered by insurance in a blanket policy.

Peter Reys, a Mexican boy about six years old, had his left foot painfully mangled by a San Antonio & Arkansas Pass freight train, at the Main Street crossing shortly after 3 o'clock Wednesday evening. The boy is said to have been jumping on the caboose of a moving train when the wheels of the train struck his foot and crushed it. On page 28 Mr. Harold Hume says: "In so far as the Satsuma Orange is concerned, it is a cold temperature tree, and I do not believe that Satsuma Oranges of good quality can be produced in any region where cold temperatures are not registered during the winter."

Your soil seems to be almost the same type as at League City, probably a little more sand in it. The only thing lacking seemed to be sufficient drainage at present but that can be relieved by ditches. Notwithstanding the heavy rain this spring, everything planted seemed to grow just as good on your land as any other place I saw. If other conditions are favorable, I think that oranges and figs can successfully be grown on your land as well as garden stuff. I am entirely satisfied with my tract.

I am very much indebted to Messrs. Kolberg and Anderson for the courtesy and willingness they showed me during my stay with them. Mr. Kolberg took me around almost the entire tract. I also spent one night with them.

I have advised several of my friends to buy.
