

BIG ESTATE INVOLVED.

Grandchildren Claim They Were Cut Off in Will and Make Contest.

San Antonio, Texas, July 12.—For the conservation of a half-million dollar estate of Mrs. Sarah E. Stafford, deceased, during the pendency of the contest of the will, County Judge Shook has decided to appoint a temporary administrator. The grandchildren of Mrs. Stafford, it is alleged, were practically cut off from inheritance in the will and are now contesting the document. They made application for a temporary administrator. Attorneys for Mrs. Myra S. Pryor, daughter of Mrs. Stafford, who under the will inherited the bulk of the estate, contested the appointment of a temporary administrator as unnecessary and asked if the court did see fit to name one that Colonel Ike T. Stafford, son of Mrs. Stafford, was one of the best men in the state.

Mrs. Stafford in the banking firm of R. E. Stafford & Co., or E. A. Hutchins, the bank's cashier, be appointed. No appointment has as yet been made. Mrs. Stafford died last May and the contest over the will resulted as soon as it was known that she had willed the bulk of her property to her only living daughter, Mrs. Myra S. Pryor. Three grandchildren, issue of a deceased son and daughter, were cut off with small legacies and a suit attempting to break the will was instituted, alleging undue influence over Mrs. Stafford, who was old and feeble at the time of her death, and was residing with the family of Mrs. Pryor.

I wish to state that I have never been consulted by any one relative to speaking on this occasion, or by any one having anything to do with the arrangements there at Matthews, or elsewhere. In fact I have declined making any speeches in this campaign for personal reasons, and while I am bitterly opposed to the amendment, and am doing all in my power to defeat it, yet I have declined to make any public speeches for the reason stated, and have positively not given any one my permission to advertise me as one of the speakers at Matthews on the 14th.
