The following important probate orders were entered this week:

In the guardianship of Howena Walker, minor, Mrs. Ed Rand, guardian, made application to present new bond in the sum of \$80,000, which was granted. This action became necessary for the reason that the bonding company which was surety upon her former bond, has suffered a lapse of its charter rights in Texas.

In the estate of Geo. Abbe, deceased, W. S. Strickland and M. E. Guyann, the temporary administrators, made their final report, which was approved by the court. It showed the collection of \$10,550.00 in cash during the month, and the sum of \$3,123.94 paid out. An allowance of \$690.65 was made to the temporary administrators by the court. The same parties were appointed permanent administrators under bond of \$50,000 and Fox Stephens, J. B. Westmoreland and Dr. F. O. Norris were appointed appraisers.

In the estate of John W. Westmoreland, deceased, the final report of J. R. Westmoreland, as temporary administrator, was presented and approved; which showed the receipt of \$8,686.31 and the payment of \$8,134.79. Mr. Westmoreland was appointed permanent administrator, with bond fixed in the sum of \$40,000.00, and M. E. Guyann, Dr. F. O. Norris and J. P. Anderson were appointed appraisers.
