Meeting of Southern Rice Grow-

ers' Association.

The members of the Southern

Rice Growers' Association of

this district held their first an-

nuual meeting at their offices in

this city Saturday afternoon.

The meeting was well attended,

representatives being present

from Garwood, Chesterville, Lis-

sie, East Bernard, Nottawa and

Eagle Lake. The local manager,

Mr. E. A. Egnus, made a short

address in which he spoke of the

work already accomplished by

the Association and gave a gen-

eral outline of their plans for the

future. He stated that the ob-

ject of the meeting was the elec-

tion of a director and a local man-

ager. Mr. Egnus was elected

by acclamation both director and

local manager.

The Association has been grow-

ing steadily since its organiza-

tion and now has control of 80

percent of the acreage in Texas

and about 85 percent in Louisi-

ana. It is conceded by all well

posted rice men that the big ex-

port deal that the Association ef-

fectly has cleared up the com-

plex conditions and has materi-

ally advanced the price of every

sack of rice that will be harvest-

ed this fall. This export move-

ment alone has demonstrated to

the rice planters the value and

necessity of organization, and a

successful future for the Asso-

ciation is now assured.

The annual stockholders' meet-

ing of the Association will be

held in Beaumont on August 2-

3rd and will, without doubt, be

the largest and most instructive

series of meetings ever held in

the rice belt. Among the prom-

inent speakers will be Mr. B. B.

Yakum, the president of the Fris-

cosystem. Mr. Yakum is one of

the big men in the business world

today and is the farmers' friend.

He is a firm believer in the value

of farmers' co-operative move-

ments and his address will be

an interesting one. The Beau-

mont Chamber of Commerce is

to give an entertainment in the

nature of a boat ride to Port Au-

thor to be followed by an excu-

sion trip to Galveston.
