The following editorial from
the *Crowley (La.) Signal* will be
of interest to the rice farmers of
this vicinity: "Secretary Wilk-
ins, of the Southern Rice Grow-
ers' Association, may have set
his figures a trifle high in esti-
mating that the association will
control five million bags, but it
is plain that the farmers' organi-
zation will handle a large enough
percentage of the rice crop this
year to enable it to fix prices on
a reasonable basis. In Acadia
parish more than two-thirds of
the crop will be sold through the
association, and it is now safe to
say that throughout the rice belt
the average of the rice pledged
to the association will run over
two-thirds. More than eighty
per cent in claimed in Texas, and
the indications are that the or-
ganization will be as successful
in Arkansas as it has been on the
coast.

It is conceded that the Southern
Rice Growers' Association has
saved the American rice farmers
this year millions of dollars. The
"export deal" alone prevented
prices from slumping to the
point so confidently predicted by
New Orleans. It is now gener-
ally recognized as a fact that if the
Southern Rice Growers' Asso-
ciation had not been in the field,
the New Orleans forecast that
rough would drop to \$1.50 a bar-
rel would have been fulfilled
shortly after the turn of the year.
The rice farmer has been con-
vinced that his interests lie with
the association, and it will be
stronger than ever when the sea-
son opens.

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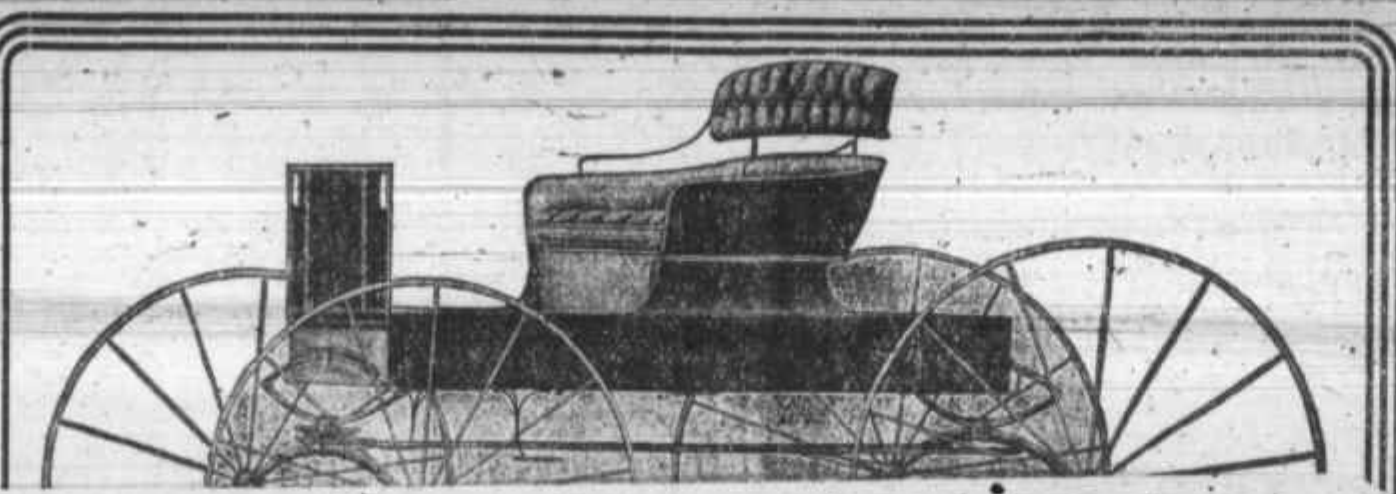
