NEW ENEMY TO COTTON.

Fields in Vicinity of Columbus
bus Affected by New Bug.

Columbus, Texas, August 1.

A new enemy of the cotton plant

has made its appearance in this section, known to be infesting fields from the Colorado river at Columbus to a point in the Eagle Lake bottom, fifteen miles away. How great a territory is affected by them is not known at this time. It is a bug of the beetle variety, nine-sixteenth of an inch in length and three-sixteenth of an inch in width across its back. Its color is a solid brown. It differs from a sharp-shoot in that it is a darker color and has a heavier body, has a long weevil bill instead of an alligator head and prominently noticeable. It eats the pollen and the pistil of the bloom. Shortly after entering the blossom closes, enveloping the insect. The bloom promptly dies.

W. E. Bridge poisoned his cotton with Paris green to kill the leaf worm and noticed the effect of the poison on this new insect a few days ago. He reports that the insects are as numerous as before and he can not find that he has killed any. It is Mr. Bridge's opinion that this new insect is doing fully as much damage to his cotton crop as is the boll weevil. Several of the insects with the blossoms they have been feeding on have been sent to the State entomologist at College Station.
