He says he finds the worms and weevils both working, that the cotton on the heavy land is not making, but the light land cotton is still making. Mr. John Matthews says his cane land cotton is doing splendidly, that it is still putting on, and with two more weeks of weather like the week just passed, he is of the opinion that it will make a quarter of a bale to the acre more.

The farmers are poisoning, but as poison is difficult to procure the worms are increasing very fast. Cotton is opening fast and is being marketed at the rate of about fifty bales a day.

The Doctor advanced some new theories on this great question which has been agitated in the

land for forty years. He says it is a question that sooner or later will have to be solved, and a question that the white men of the South will have to solve. "Four theories have been advanced for the solving of this problem," he said. "First that he be sent back to Africa and colonized. Second, that the right of franchise be taken away from him," but he said, "when either of these is attempted we are confronted by the fifteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States. The third theory is the swift and sure vengeance of mob law, but this has been tried for forty years and has failed." "The most feasible theory," stated the Doctor, "is that you educate and Christianize the negro. Whiskey in the hands of the negro is the evil that is causing this problem to stand out so vividly before us. Remove whiskey by your vote from the negro, and when you do you put the check rein to that class of white men that exploit and use him. When this is done, this question will have been solved, and it will bring about the greatest possible reform to the negro race. This is a question that must be remedied by the South."

The above are extracts from Dr. Norris' address. He gave his hearers some facts that cannot but make an impression upon them. We regret that every person in Eagle Lake did not hear the Doctor's talk on this question last night.

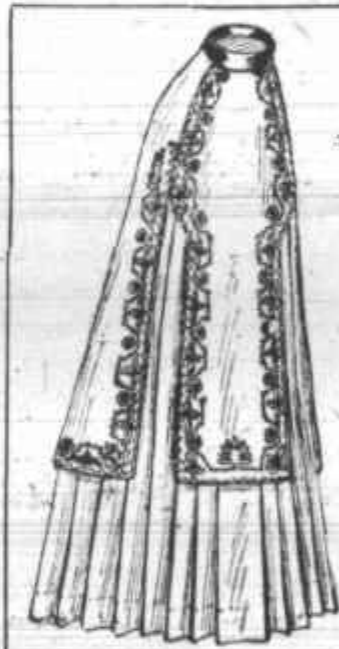
