Let's work for a stock law in
Eagle Lake, and then we will see
many shade trees put out and
more cement sidewalks built. A
town without a stock law is in
the "non-progressive" class. It
is up to us to get Eagle Lake out
of that class. We need a stock
law to further improve our town.

The question of prohibition
should have nothing whatever to
do with candidates for county
offices. A man, regardless of
his views on the liquor question,
should be elected for county of-
fice solely on his merits. Too
much agitation of this question
in county politics is very liable
to bring on some precinct or
even city local option elections.

If there was only some way to
keep the lake full of water again,
it would not be but a very short
while until the business firms of
Eagle Lake would be reaping an
increased patronage, and the
general health of the entire com-
munity would be improved. The
lake is the chiefest attraction
that our town has ever had, and
the shame of Eagle Lake is that
it is permitted to remain in its
present unsightly and unhealth-
ful condition.

of county politics.

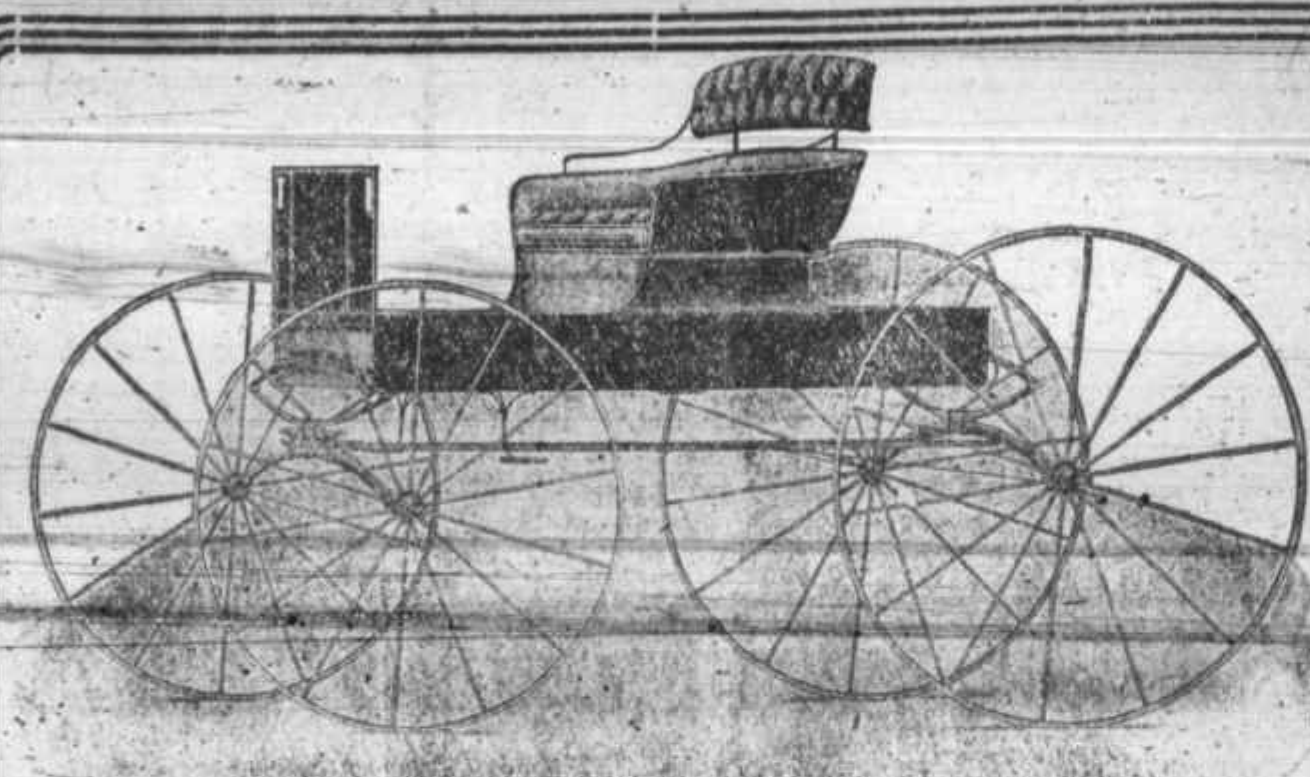
Many cement sidewalks have

The "two term" move for
county office in Colorado County
in the white man's primary is
being favorably commented on
nearly everywhere that it is
talked, and the talk is beginning
to be pretty general. Though a
little early to talk county politics,
it is hinted that there promises
to be a lively campaign at the next
election, as it is said there will
be a full ticket out on the "two
term" platform.

There is considerable agitation
all over the county for a "two
term" clause into the White
Man's Party, and we are told,
this agitation is meeting with fa-
vorable comment everywhere.
Some of the leading and most in-
fluential citizens of Eagle Lake
are strongly in favor of it. While
