H. S. VINEYARD FOR SHERIFF
Popular Eagle Lake Citizen Will
Be Candidate For Sheriff.

a candidate at the coming elec-
tion for the office of sheriff of
Colorado County, and at the
proper time will give out his an-
nouncement. It is rumored that
Mr. Vineyard's candidacy will
be subject to the "two term"
proposition which has been
strongly advocated throughout
the county. His past record as
a peace officer clearly shows
that he is in every way qualified
to make his Colorado County one
of the best officers the county
has ever had. He is not only
popular in Eagle Lake, his home
town, but is well known and pop-
ular in all parts of the county.
Mr. Vineyard has received

home town alone, but from all
sections of the county asking

FALSE REPORT CORRECTED.
