AUTO WRECKED BY TRAIN.

Ad Adams' Car Completely Demolished by Passenger Train.

Yesterday afternoon the east bound Sunset passenger train No. 8, due here at 4:05 o'clock p. m., struck Mr. Ad Adams' car at the crossing near the McClanahan rice farm, about four miles east of Eagle Lake, between here and Lissie. Mr. Adams, with O. L. Payte and a Mr. Alexander from San Angelo, were in the car and were attempting to cross going in the direction of Chesterville, not seeing the oncoming train, which at this point is under full speed. Mr. Robt. Schrafft was coming up to the crossing from the opposite side when his team began to scare at the auto. Mr. Adams brought his car to a sudden stop and was in the act of backing up to give Mr. Schrafft's team the right of way when the engine, which was almost upon them, sounded the danger signal. All three jumped from the car. Mr. Adams being handicapped by the steering wheel, was the last to leave the car. His wrist and one leg were seriously broken. It being the opinion that he was struck by the cylinder box on the engine. The car was hit almost squarely in the center by the engine, carried over a cattle guard and for a distance of about 200 yards, and thrown about ten feet out from the track, one solid mass of junk. Pieces of the car were scattered the full distance, and a part of the wood work on the coxcatcher was broken off. So narrow was their escape, that Mr. Schrafft, who witnessed the accident, says that some of them were still in the air from their leap from the car when the engine struck it. The wrecked car was a four-passenger Buick, and that the car was an open one, both front and rear, making it easier for them to get out of, is no doubt the means of the occupants escaping with their lives.

Mr. Marion S. Hope was killed on M. H. Townsend's ranch near Nixon, in Gonzales county, about noon last Sunday by a horse falling on him. He had gone out to the calf pasture to drive up some calves and was riding a large Norman horse, which stumbled and fell on him. Relatives reached him shortly after the accident but his neck was broken and he never regained consciousness, living only a short while after the fatal accident. The remains were interred at Wharton Tuesday where he has two children buried. Mr. Hope was well known in this county, having formerly resided at Columbus. He was about 45 or 50 years of age and leaves a wife, two grown sons by a former wife, and several smaller children.
