automatic lawn sprinklers posi-
tively not allowed.

We absolutely prohibit the use
of water for irrigating gardens.
If you insist upon continuing this
practice you will have to be placed
on a meter system.

The waterworks system is op-
erated for the comfort and safety
of the public, and we cannot per-
mit any one individual to take
more rights than an other as that
would be unfair.
