Doings on Satsuma Ridge.

The editor enjoyed a pleasant drive with Mr. O. G. Kolberg out to Satsuma Ridge last Saturday evening and was greatly surprised to see so many improvements being made out there. On this tract, the Texas Coast Land Company's tract, there are 4325 acres and all of this land has been sold with the exception of 400 acres. While many of the purchasers have not yet begun to improve or develop their land, others are improving, cultivating, putting out fig and orange orchards, etc. The work done by Messrs. Kolberg and Anderson, who are certainly experts in this line. These gentlemen now have 150 acres of orange and fig orchards under their care, and about fifty acres more will be put out during the coming year. We saw about 50 acres of corn belonging to these gentlemen that produced from 40 to 50 bushels to the acre. In years: This land has been worked and cultivated several years before it was planted to corn.

will produce much more. The land is properly worked. Mr. Kolberg states that those who have made a failure there are inexperienced farmers who have never farmed before, but who came here from other states not knowing the conditions of this country, and with practically no capital to operate on, and expected to make a big crop the first year before the ground was put in proper condition. The orange and fig orchards are looking well and are doing nicely despite the very unfavorable season and the cold winter. The orange trees were given a set-back by the cold weather of last winter but came out in fine condition again. There are many 2, 3, 4 and some 20 acre fig orchards set out on this land that will be in bearing next year. The fig orchards set out two years ago are now in bearing and the trees are loaded with fruit. These figs are being canned and will shortly be placed on the market. The canning is being done by Mrs. Leon D. Brown and Mrs. Helen Rector, who are certainly proficient in this line. The canning plant is yet on a small scale, but we venture the assertion that there is no plant anywhere where the work is carried on in a more cleanly and sanitary manner. Everything connected with the plant is as neat as a pin. Eagle Lake sugar is used in preserving the figs, making them an entirely new product. These figs are delicious. Beautiful in color and excellent in taste. Through the kindness of Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Rector, the HEADLIGHT family is enjoying some of the preserves and our verdict is there are none better. Next season, when the fig acreage will be increased considerably, it is the purpose of those interested to organize a co-operative fig preserving plant of people interest.
