About The Stock Law.

No change can be made in any law without working a hardship on some one, but the only question worth considering is, "who will be helped and who injured," that is to say, on which side is the largest interest, and what is the condition of those helped as compared to those hurt by it? Not many years ago our prairie lands were not considered to be worth anything except for stock raising and to have fenced off the stock would have entailed an expense out of all proportion to the profit gained or the number of people benefited. At that time the business of the country supported a population of three or four hundred people in the town. But conditions have changed and it has been demonstrated that our prairie lands are susceptible to profitable farming. Because of this change from stock to cultivated farms at least 90 percent of unfenced lands are now in farms and the town has quadrupled in population. The pendulum has swung to the other extreme and it is now an inexcusable hardship to force the farmer to fence

against 10 percent of land still used for stock, which is not already fenced, that the land owner may get a little profit out of his holdings. Think this matter over and decide what you think is right and just in the premises.
