Last night about 10 o'clock news reached town that young Ben Garrett was killed at Holman, a small place about four miles north of town. Particulars are hard to get, but it is alleged a crowd became involved in a row and pistols were drawn. Constable Smith ran up to arrest Garrett and Garrett is said to have fired at Smith. His fire was returned, Garrett being shot four times, once through the left arm, through the shoulder and near the heart, and dying about one hour later.

Garrett was only 25 years of age. He leaves a father and a sister, Mrs. Robert Shaw of this city.

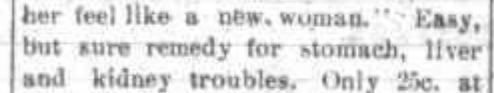
