School Will Open Monday Morn- ing.

The HEADLIGHT is in receipt of the following communication from Prof. J. H. Morgan:

A meeting of the teachers will be held at the school house Saturday at 9 a. m. for the purpose of organizing for their year's work. All patrons and trustees are invited to be present and encourage the teachers in their preparation for the best work possible.

The foundation has been laid for the best school in this part of the State in that no one can deny the resources of our community or doubt but that our people believe that the best is not too good for our children, and that they stand ready to respond to every effort made to further the interests of the school, believing that the efficiency of the same will materially aid in the development of every interest that is to enter into a "Greater Eagle Lake."

The hearty co-operation of patrons, the children and others is not only desired but it is expected. Every one should be, and is expected to be, ready to sacrifice time, money and personal may I not say selfish, desires to the interest of the school as a whole.

I believe in you and do not hesitate to place my trust in your love for progress and the right. Therefore I set forth the following plans of your school board, believing that they will meet with an unanimous and hearty approval.

The plans are to establish an Industrial Department in our schools, based on the following:

The State has made provision whereby a community may receive aid for this purpose. A like amount is raised by the community.

As much as \$2,000 may be received each year for two years, two years being the limit for appropriations by the state. We can reasonably expect the State to continue this aid.

We have placed a claim for \$2,000, based on the amount we have invested in the basement of the school building. We also have a good reason to expect aid from an eminent philanthropist of Texas.

The board has decided to equip the building at once for the do-

mestic Science and has employ-

ed a teacher.
The money from the State can not be used to pay teachers and the incidental expenses, so the necessity for more than the \$3,000 that we expect to be available for equipment is evident.

A teacher of Manual training and agriculture who has had six years of experience in the service of the State at College Station and Fort Worth is to meet with the board Saturday.

It has been estimated that \$3,000 will be required to complete the equipment of the building without this feature and furnish the teachers, using the State money for industrial equipment only.

The board proposes to ask the city council to call an election for the purpose of voting the \$3,000 in bonds to meet the emergency. The additional tax would be less than 3 cents and will on daily be paid by the same as the raising of same by private subscription.

Additional information will be gladly furnished concerning the plans for completing the building. The board is in communication with the Industrial Department.

The following resolution sets forth the advantages and purpose of this form of education. Please read and consider. Then let us know what you think about it. If you would like to make a donation it will be gladly received.

Whereas it is known that many of the pupils of our schools attend because there is nothing else for them to do; that they are without appreciation for educational advantages, definiteness of purpose or zeal for personal profit; that we are graduating incompetents and causing those to drop out who fail to find anything that appeals to their interests or satisfies their needs; and

Whereas it is also known that Domestic Science and Manual Training give us a people more handy and practical for domestic life and better skilled in trades, a citizenship with an entirely different intellectual fiber, that shop work engenders a habit of observation, a knowledge of the difference between accuracy and vagueness, and an insight into nature's complexity and into the inadequacy of all abstract verbal accounts of real phenomena, which once wrought in the mind remains there as lifelong possessions; that they give honesty, for when you express yourself by making things, and not by using words, it becomes impossible to dissimulate your vagueness or ignorance by ambiguity; that they confer precision, because, if you are doing a thing you must do it definitely right or definitely wrong; that they beget a habit of self-reliance; that they keep the interest and attention always cheerfully engaged; and reduce the teachers' disciplinary functions to a minimum. There is no impression without expression; and

Whereas the boy should be given a higher conception of his duties of citizenship, better social thinking and a greater efficiency in getting a part of the world's work done; that he may have his nature so rounded out as to give him better command of himself, his outlook upon life broadened and an opportunity to be more than a school loafer and of enthusiasm or development;

Therefore be it ordered that we the trustees of the Eagle Lake Schools establish and equip a department of Domestic Science at once and use every endeavor to provide means for the estab-

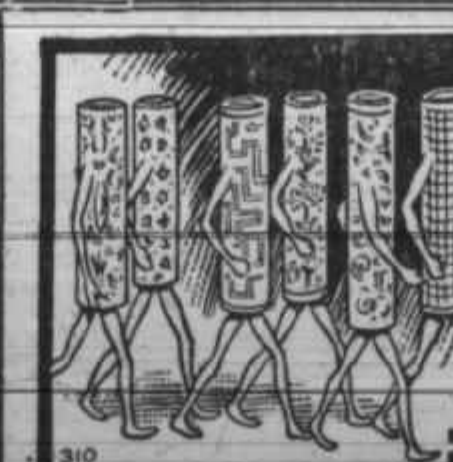
Mr. August Tipp was a pleasant caller at our office yesterday morning to renew his subscription to the old reliable for another year.
