At a special meeting of the school board held Tuesday night, it was decided to add another branch to the school, that of domestic science which will treat of sewing, cooking, etc. To add this branch it will necessitate the employing of another teacher. The board is now in correspondence with a teacher for this department and it is likely that the teacher will be selected in the next day or two. The school board is also making an effort to add an industrial and manual training department, but in order to do this the school must have more money. The members of the board met Tuesday night with the city council to see what steps can be taken in order to raise this amount. The board, to put this additional branch into the school must raise \$1,000. If this amount can be raised the State will give \$2,000. Col. Brackenridge of San Antonio, who is a personal friend of Prof. Morgan, has promised a donation to this end. The school board is using every effort to build the school up to a high standard, and if their present plans can be carried through, our school will then affiliate with the State University and the other higher schools. This is a matter that all citizens of the town should interest themselves in, give the school board their assistance and help them in every way to carry out their plans which will mean so much for the upbuilding of the Eagle Lake school.

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HARD LUCK FOR CONVICT.
Pardoned From Bonus Camp Last Friday Was Rearrested Same Day.

Listening to a message as it came over the telegraph wire, calling for his arrest on a Federal complaint, only a few hours after he had been discharged from the Bonus farm and given money for railroad fare to return to his wife and children in North Texas, on his first visit in four years, was the predicament of Edgar Phillips, a young white man, who was in the Bonus camp last Friday while waiting at the Sunset depot for the arrival of the passenger train.

Phillips had studied telegraphy early in life and was able to read the message for his arrest as it was clicked off by the telegraph instrument.

Although only released a few hours before from the State farm at Bonus, on a pardon granted by Governor Colquitt at the request of his wife, Phillips awaited the arrival of City Marshal Vineyard, to whom the message he read was sent, to take him into custody. He made no attempt to get away, and as Mr. Vineyard walked up, said: "I guess I'm the man you're looking for."

Deputy United States Marshal L. R. McFarlane came up from Houston Saturday and took the prisoner back to Houston on the afternoon train and lodged him in the Harris county jail in default of a \$500 bond for his appearance before the Federal court in Paris.

Phillips had telegraphed his family at Texarkana that he would reach home on Saturday afternoon, but the arrival of the message calling for his arrest caused him to send another wire telling of his arrest.

Phillips wife has been untiring in her effort for his liberty during the four years of his confinement. She appeared before Governor Colquitt several weeks ago and prayed for the restoration of her husband, who had served four years of a twelve year sentence.

The HEADLIGHT man talked with Phillips after he had been arrested by Mr. Vineyard. Phillips stated that the charge that he was wanted on was a charge of embezzlement of \$4.43 in stamps while he was a rural mail carrier at Red River county. He stated that the stamps were in possession of another carrier at the time of the postoffice inspector's visit when they should have been in his possession. This was in 1905 before being sent to the State prison from Red River county on six charges of forgery, his punishment having been fixed at 10 years in each case.
