To The Patrons of The Eagle Lake School.

It is the intention of the School Board to raise the course of study in our school so as to be able to affiliate in full with the State University. To do this we will have to have another teacher, and some equipment in the building for the teachers to work with. This is absolutely necessary to meet the University requirements. Our Superintendent wishes to add departments of domestic science and manual training. Now to do this will require some fifteen hundred dollars in cash which the Board has not got.

Some four years ago the City Council increased the School District beyond the limits of the City to embrace the outlying territory for school purposes only. There were many children residing in the territory so embraced who had been and still enjoy the city school. The school limits were extended so that a tax could be levied and collected for school purposes only. With this tax the school board can equip the school and add sufficient teachers to fully amply with the State University.

A Corporation has seen fit to contest this tax levy and has forced the city to sue same for taxes, this case is now on appeal.
