To the Public.
I wish hereby to inform the citizens of Colorado County that I will not be a candidate for the office of tax collector at the election to be held in 1912.

I am pleased to state that the records of my office are ready at any time to be carefully inspected by those in authority, and

whose duty it is to examine and inspect same, and I will at all times take pleasure in presenting said records to any citizen of Colorado County who may desire to investigate and ascertain whether or not I have faithfully and efficiently discharged the duties of said office, and I assure the people of Colorado County that I will be pleased to deliver to my suc-

cessor at the close of my present term of office in such conditions as will, I feel sure, meet their approval.
It is with a degree of pride that I invite an investigation of delinquent tax record of the office. At the time of my induction into the office, the collections of delinquent taxes amounted to but little. During my incumbency in the office I collected delinquent taxes, due the state and county, aggregating about \$26,280.00.

The earnest and persistent effort I made to collect such taxes (for which I claim no credit as it was my sworn duty to do so) was seized upon by certain enemies, and was used as a means of fighting me under cover and accusing me to those not well informed as to such matters, of collecting taxes illegally and appropriating same to my own use and benefit, especially was this true during the last campaign. But inasmuch as I was fully vindicated and acquitted of such unjust charges by the people of this county by a re-election to the office by a good majority, I feel that such accusations need no further answer, and I take this method of expressing my heartfelt thanks to the people of Colorado County for their kind expressions of confidence in my integrity as a man and a public servant.

I have received many requests from friends in every portion of our county asking me to offer myself for re-election at the primaries to be held next year, and they have assured me of their earnest and energetic support, but as I do not wish to enter another campaign that would involve personalities that would be very unpleasant to me and feeling that the people of old Colorado County have already honored me with their votes sufficiently, and while I deeply appreciate the expressions of confidence in me contained in these requests, I feel that I have had all of political turmoil, which is very distasteful to me, that I care to endure, I have concluded not to again submit my name for re-election to said office, however feeling confident with the support already promised me that I would have been re-elected.

I shall take pleasure in extending to my successor, whoever he may be, every courtesy and all assistance within my power, and to seek to aid him in any and every way that will be of service to him in familiarizing himself with the duties of the office.
